ELEVEN YEARS AFTER "9/11"

Chis past Tuesday, September 11th, we marked the 11th Anniversary of the event we call "9/11", as well as the 10th anniversary of marking the anniversary. How quickly the march of time has made this cataclysmic event yet another historical event, with its causes and consequences, all of its pieces mooted and picked apart in an effort to define what it meant for our country and the world-at-large.

On that day, four teams of Islamist commandoes hijacked four commercial planes filled with passengers in order to use the jets as guided missiles. They succeeded in striking the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York City and the seat of the U.S. military command at the Pentagon building in Washington, D.C. On the fourth plane the passengers fought back, realizing what was in store for them, and that plane crashed without any survivors in a field in Pennsylvania.

It was a spectacularly awful success, although the loss of life—great as it was—was far less than what the fanatics had hoped to inflict on the American people. Who of us old enough to remember that day can ever forget the shock, followed by an awareness of just how vulnerable the nation was to further attacks?

The immediate aftermath of "9/11" was an experience of national unity such as I can never recall in my lifetime, before or since. Older generations compared it to the way things were after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor in 1941. People seemed to set aside their differences. There was no mass panic. Outside of a few isolated incidents, Muslims living in America were not scapegoated. There was a seriousness of purpose in our people. Churches were fuller than they had been in years.

Eleven years later, it is hard to believe there was such unity at that moment in the United States, so divided and factionalized does it appear we've become. In the days after "9/11", you thought: "This has changed us. Things can never be the same again." There was an expression used to censure people who showed a self-centered, oblivious attitude in the wake of the cataclysm: *"That is so '9/10'!"*

Now, eleven years later, Osama Bin Laden, the mastermind behind the "9/11" attack, is dead, cornered and killed in his hideout by our brave Navy SEALS after a decade-long manhunt. We went to war first in Afghanistan and then in Iraq in an effort to destroy the terrorist bases. We

September 16th, A.D. 2012 The 16th Sunday after Pentecost and the 24th of the Year Mary Immaculate of Lourdes, Newton/Needham, Massachusetts discovered that fanatical groups of Islamists, who believe they are justified in making war on all non-Muslims as well as on those Muslims who don't submit to them, are like the monstrous Hydra of Greek mythology. In mythology, the Hydra was a huge sea serpent with nine heads. As soon as one was cut off, two more grew, unless the severed head could be immediately cauterized. Finally, the monster was slain by Hercules, but the multi-headed Hydra remains the image to us of an evil which not only cannot be killed off by direct attack, but multiplies and gains strength just from such a direct attack.

We have been at war now for more than a decade: our enemies have been damaged, but far from beaten. Indeed, the popular uprisings against the Arab despotisms we have followed in the news this year have given militant Islam renewed potency. On this year's anniversary of 9/11 we saw Islamist mobs destroy a consulate in Libya, murdering our ambassador, and storm our embassy in Cairo.

The kind of mass-casualty attack of 9/11 has not been repeated over these eleven years, but there have been close calls and of those that we know about, many have been thwarted by providential accident (God's divine protection!) rather than by any great effectiveness of our security-state measures.

The military campaigns unleashed in 2001-2003 in order to deal out retribution to our attackers and neutralize them against any future terror-strike turned into prolonged, open-ended counter-insurgency operations, which no amount of political "spin" could pass off as "Victory". More than 6,000 American military lost their lives in Iraq, more than 2,000 have died in Afghanistan. The severely wounded number in the tens of thousands. Our returning veterans have to contend with many of their countrymen who would just as soon forget the whole thing. And the populations of Iraq and Afghanistan, caught in the cross-fire, are not saying "thank you" to us for all the blood and treasure we expended on their behalf.

For those on the receiving end, war undertaken for humanitarian purposes is just as lethal and destructive as any other war.

As Catholic believers, conscious of our duty to our nation, we need to let the supernatural perspective of our faith continually inform our response to these times. Foremost is the response of prayer. I go back to those first weeks after 9/11 and the well-attended churches. Biblical religion has always seen calamitous events as a time of the Lord's "visitation", a time to turn to the Lord with all our hearts, repenting our sins, and seeking to live our lives with greater fidelity to His commandments, come what may.
