JUNE IS THE MONTH OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS



(FRONT COVER: "The Adoration of the Sacred Heart of Jesus with St. Ignatius Loyola and St. Aloysius Gonzaga", by the artist Jose de Paez, 1720-1790. The month of June is especially devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which is an extension of our worship of Christ in the Holy Eucharist. His human Heart is His love for us.)

The Church has given us three ways:

Method 1: *Lectio selecta* (selected reading)

Read the Scripture readings for Mass on Sundays and weekdays. The Church has selected specific passages of Scripture for every Mass from both the Old and New Testaments. As you read these passages, you can begin to develop a sense for the continuity of the story of God's plan of loving goodness for mankind, as it is fulfilled in Jesus Christ. You can find daily readings for Mass online, or you can purchase a Missal or Missalette from your local Catholic bookstore to follow the Church's cycle of daily readings. This is a worthy investment.

Method 2: *Lectio divina* (divine reading) This method in Scripture

reading involves concentrating on one passage only, reading it slowly and prayerfully, and awaiting the enlightenment of the Holy Spirit as He makes a particular aspect of the passage's meaning clear to you. I recommend taking one of the Gospel readings from Mass, or part of a Psalm. Before you begin, pray for the Holy Spirit to reveal to you whatever He wills you to know. Then, read the selected passage aloud slowly about 3 times, being attentive to any word(s) or phrase(s) that stick out to you. Once you have identified this word or phrase, slowly meditate upon it, like you're savoring or chewing a delicious bite of food. As you meditate on the word or phrase, gradually turn your meditation into a prayer. As God has spoken to you, now speak to Him, thanking Him for what you have learned, and asking for His help to incorporate what you have learned into your life. Finally, think about specific ways you can act on what you've learned, so that you can become more holy and virtuous. As you close, rest quietly in the presence of God, again savoring the time you've had to commune with

Pastor's Note



SCRIPTURE STUDY AND THE GOSPEL OF ST. LUKE

As many of you know, I am teaching a weekly Bible Study on the Gospel of St. Luke. As part of the ongoing work of evangelization at our parish, Fr. Higgins has asked me to write weekly notes that summarize some of the content of these weekly studies, as an aid to all of our parishioners in their own personal Bible reading. To introduce this weekly column, I wanted to stress first of all the importance of regular Bible reading for Catholics. God's Word is replete with inestimable spiritual treasures and graces, just waiting to be unlocked. I cannot recommend Bible reading enough. Some might ask, though, "How can I read the Bible?" or "How can I read the Bible better?"

your Heavenly Father. This whole process should take about 20 minutes, and it usually flies by more quickly than you would think.

Method 3: *Lectio continua* (continuous reading)

This method entails reading a particular book of the Bible from beginning to end. This is the method of our weekly parish Bible study, as we study the Gospel of Luke. Reading the Bible like this has many benefits. You can begin to establish a context for the readings at Mass, as well as discover the unique contributions of the author, as well as the particular themes he emphasizes in his portrayal of God and Christ. You can find out how he tailored God's message to his specific audience, and thus, you can learn how to apply God's word better in your life. Slow, progressive study of one book at a time can also help you to have a greater recall of Scripture, because you are able to invest more time in the precious details that make each book of the Bible a unique masterpiece within a larger masterwork.

I extend an invitation to any and all who are interested in learning more about the Bible to come to the weekly Bible Study, which I plan to host at an additional time in the near future for those unable to come on Friday mornings (stay tuned for more details). I hope that you will enjoy the forthcoming notes on Luke's Gospel, and that reading Scripture will increase your love for Christ and His Church.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Chapter 1:1-4

Before I begin this week's column, I want to mention that among the resources and commentaries that I consult in preparation for the weekly Bible Study, the Ignatius Catholic Study Bible is an extremely helpful

and insightful volume. Thus, I highly recommend it to anyone as a wonderfully reliable resource for Scripture study. I also like to consult the Orthodox Study Bible for its similarly rich theological insights. The notes for this weekly column, while they reflect my own synthesis of the material in other study Bibles as well as my own reflection, they are also drawn in a particular way from the Ignatius Catholic Study Bible and the Orthodox Study Bible.

In the first four verses of chapter 1 of Luke's Gospel, Luke addresses a certain patron of an early church community named *Theophilus*, and explains the primary reason he has written his account of Jesus. According to a word study of the Greek text in the Ignatius Study Bible, Luke's writings about Jesus are explicitly an act of catechesis. Luke is handing on in written form what he himself has investigated thoroughly. This reflects precisely the Catholic teaching regarding the unity of Scripture and Tradition in the transmission of Divine Revelation. Luke's hope is that the church community that hears and reads his work will "know the truth" about Jesus, building upon the

oral Apostolic Tradition they already received in their Christian Initiation.

Oftentimes as Christians, we need encouragement in the face of persecution, discouragement, and other challenges to our faith, just like Luke's community probably did. As the Ignatius Study Bible notes, Luke seeks to "confirm" the truth of the message they and we have all received in our baptism and confirmation, and to strengthen our resolve to be faithful disciples of Jesus Christ. We can know with certainty that Jesus was truly incarnate, that he really died and rose from the dead. Faith and Reason complement each other. God expects us to use both our minds and our hearts in the pursuit of the Truth. Many Biblical Commentaries in their analysis of Luke's Gospel include many or all of the following themes I have listed below. You can refer to them like a compass as you read each chapter in Luke, so as to discover what he's trying to focus on and communicate to his audience about Jesus.


