



Pastor's Note

OUR LADY'S GREAT GLORY

St. Teresa of Avila, one of the great mystic saints of the Church, describes the vision she was given of Our Lady's Assumption:

One day, the Feast of the Assumption of Our Lady, Queen of Angels, the Lord desired to grant me the following favor; in a rapture He showed me her ascent to heaven, the happiness and solemnity with which she was received, and the place where she is. The glory my spirit experienced in seeing so much glory was magnificent. The effects of this favor were great...I was left with a longing to serve Our Lady since she deserved this so much.

The Feast of the Assumption each year brings with it the occasion for us to celebrate Our Lady's great glory.

This glory may be looked at first of all from the point of view of her own reward. From the moment of her *Fiat* to the Angel Gabriel at

Nazareth (*"Behold the handmaid of the Lord: Be it done unto me according to thy word."*) to the Foot of the Cross at Mt. Calvary, to her presence in the midst of the disciples in the days leading up to Pentecost, Mary has been completely conformed to the Divine Will in the way that only an absolutely pure soul can be. After the Ascension of the Risen Christ into Heaven, Mary remained alive on the earth for a significant amount of time, no doubt for the encouragement of the first Christians. With the Assumption she is at last re-united with her Divine Son Jesus and given the generous and just reward by God the Holy Trinity for her faithfulness, her unique co-operative rôle in the working out of the Redemption.

The glory of Our Lady may also be looked at from the point of view of its benefit to us. With Mary's exaltation, her office of maternal intercession, alluded to in Christ's dying words on the Cross, *"Behold thy Mother."* (John 19:27), is opened upon the world of time and space in a way that simply staggers the believing mind. Such is what inspired St. Bernard of Clairvaux to exclaim, *"De Maria numquam satis"*— the sense of which may be figuratively translated as: *"Of the Blessed Virgin Mary, one can never come to end of all that she is and all that she means for the world."*

Finally, the glory of Our Lady in the Assumption may be looked at from the point of view of what we have to look forward to in the life-to-come. Mary already shares in the final transfiguration of the created human soul in eternal life— immortal soul and resurrected body. This is our destiny too. It cannot be said often enough: Christian heaven is not a pleasant dream-world, an afterglow of the life of earth. It is instead the *real* life compared to which this earthly journey, even at its best, is but a foretaste pointing the way to something greater.

SCRIPTURE STUDY COLUMN



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY

Luke 2:1-20 Part 1

Of the many Scripture passages with which Christians are familiar, St. Luke's narrative of the birth of Christ is probably the most familiar, along with the 23rd Psalm. We hear it every Christmas at Mass, and we hear it told with such poise by Linus

in the beloved cartoon, *A Charlie Brown Christmas*.

We know now from archeological and historical research that the stable in which Jesus was born was more like a cave than a charming wooden structure. It could be comparable to a garage in an average American house. If you can imagine your house packed with people gathered for a multi-generational family reunion, you can get an approximate idea of what this scene might have been like 2,000 years ago. Your garage might be the only room not filled with people, and understandably so (it is usually filled with so much other stuff). Now imagine the inn keeper relegating a pregnant mother and her husband in the cold, dank, and cluttered garage, instead of offering an upstairs suite with privacy. This is a far cry from the sweet and consoling crèche scenes we are accustomed to seeing at Christmastide. However, this indicates the reality of the poverty and extreme lack into which Jesus was born: an environment devoid of literal warmth,

and more fundamentally, devoid of the warmth of charity to receive the incarnate God (John 1:11).

St. Cyril of Alexandria, one of the early Church Fathers, points out the Eucharistic overtones in St. Luke's repeated mention of the manger, or animal feeding trough. Christ in the manger foreshadows his Real Presence in the Eucharist as sacramental food. As He so graciously lowers himself by taking on human nature and becoming a helpless infant (cf. Phil. 2:7), so also in every Mass, He descends again from heaven and becomes fully present in our midst in a small Host. What immense humility and tenderness toward us! When we approach Holy Communion, we should meditate on the Christ Child in the manger. In the words of an old hymn, "Oh dearly, dearly has he loved, and we must love Him, too!"

We should likewise note the significance of the town of Bethlehem. It is the birthplace of king David (cf. 1 Sam. 16), and the ancestral home of both Joseph and Mary, who were descendants of David. The prophet Micah in the eighth century B.C. foretold that the Messiah would be a descendent of David, and would be born in David's birthplace of Bethlehem (cf. Micah 5:1- we hear this reading on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, year C, as well as in the Matthew's account of Christ's birth read during the feast of the Epiphany). As I discussed in my columns on the Annunciation and the *Benedictus*, the identity of the promised king descended from David was an extremely loaded idea, especially for the people living in first century Palestine. Additionally, Bethlehem means "house of bread," which is totally fitting, given the above-mentioned insight of St. Cyril, and even more fundamentally, Christ's own words, "I am the bread of life." Only in retrospect can we see the mystical implication in the town's name: the town whose name speaks of plenty becomes the birth place of the One who promises that "whoever comes to me will never hunger" (cf. John 6:35). More on St. Luke's nativity narrative next week.

LATIN MASS PROPERS
13th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Vestments: Green

INTROIT: Psalm 73: 20, 19, 23 Have regard, O Lord, to Thy covenant, and forsake not to the end the souls of Thy poor: arise, O Lord, and judge Thy cause, and forget not the voices of them that seek Thee. *Psalm 73:1* O God, why hast Thou cast us off unto the end: why is Thy wrath enkindled against the sheep of Thy pasture? Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Almighty and everlasting God, grant unto us an increase of faith, hope and charity: and that we may obtain what Thou dost promise, make us love that which Thou dost command. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Galatians 3: 16-22 Brethren: To Abraham were the promises made, and to his seed. He saith not: And to his seeds, as of many; but as of one, and to thy seed, which is Christ. Now this I say, that the testament which was confirmed by God, the law which was made after four hundred and thirty years, doth not disannul, to make the promise of no effect. For if the inheritance be of the law, it is no more of promise. But God gave it to Abraham by promise. Why then was the law? It was set because of transgressions, until the seed should come, to whom He made the promise; being ordained by angels in the hand of a mediator. Now a mediator is not of one: but God is one. Was the law then against the promises of God? God forbid. For if there had been a law given, which could give life, verily justice should have been by the law. But the Scripture hath concluded all under sin, that the promise by the faith of Jesus Christ might be given to them that believe.

GRADUAL: Psalm 73: 20, 19, 22 Have regard, O Lord, to Thy covenant, and forsake not to the end the souls of Thy poor. *V. Arise, O Lord, and judge Thy cause: remember the reproach of Thy servants.*

ALLELUIA: Psalm 89: 1 Alleluia, alleluia. *V. Lord, thou hast been our refuge, from generation to generation. Alleluia.*

GOSPEL: Luke 17: 11-19 **At** that time, as Jesus was going to Jerusalem, He passed through the midst of Samaria and Galilee: and as He entered into a certain town, there met Him ten men that were lepers, who stood afar off, and lifted up their voice, saying: Jesus, Master, have mercy on us. Whom when He saw, He said: Go, show yourselves to the priests. And it came to pass, as they went, they were made clean. And one of them, when he saw that he was made clean, went back, with a loud voice glorifying God: and he fell on his face before His feet, giving thanks: and this was a Samaritan. And Jesus answering said: Were not ten made clean? And where are the nine? There is no one found to return, and give glory to God, but this stranger. And He said to him: Arise, go thy way; for thy faith hath made thee whole.


Annual All-Parish Picnic in the parish gardens. The parish will supply the meats for the barbecue grills and the drinks.


