Pastor's Note

THE "YEAR OF FAITH" PLENARY INDULGENCE

As many of you know, Benedict XVI, Pope Emeritus, declared a "Year of Faith" to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the beginning of the Second Vatican Council. This Year (spanning from October 2012-November 2013) is a time for all Catholics to commit themselves more vigorously and generously to the mission of the Church. One of the primary ways in which we can (and should) do this, is to strengthen and deepen our knowledge of the *content* of our faith, which consequently enhances the quality of our personal *act* of faith. In other words, when we know our faith better, we can know *God Himself* better, for He is the Object of our faith (cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* nos. 142-143, 170). When we know God better, we won't want to keep the treasure to ourselves. Indeed, we will grow in our desire to draw others to Him, especially those most dear to us (*Catechism* no. 166). We need look no

further than our families, friends, co-workers and neighbors to find people with whom we can share God's love and tenderness. This is the essence of evangelization. As the pastor from my childhood parish once said, "We are like beggars pointing fellow beggars to the Bread." It's that simple. It is something to which God has indeed called us, and for which He has personally equipped us in Baptism and Confirmation (cf. *Catechism* nos. 1265-1270, 1285).


One of the things the Church has encouraged us to do during the Year of Faith is to gain a plenary indulgence by visiting the site of our Baptism, and praying for the Pope's intentions, having fulfilled the other conditions for a plenary indulgence (making your confession, receiving Communion, and being as free as possible from sinful attachments). In our Baptism, God gave each of us the gift of faith: the ability to respond freely to His offer of love and to find eternal life and happiness in Him (cf. *Catechism* nos. 51-52, 167). Our personal faith in God finds its footing in the objective content of divine revelation which Jesus entrusted to the Church. This objective faith was given to us in our Baptism, as well (cf. *Catechism* nos. 75, 98, 167-171). It is our inheritance as members of the Body of Christ. Making a personal pilgrimage to the site of our Baptism is a beautiful way of thanking Him for the gift of faith, and of expressing our commitment to Him once again.

I made this pilgrimage in July, while my wife and I were visiting my family in Philadelphia. It was a great joy to be together as a family to worship, and to see our old "stomping grounds" in Center City. I have only one living memory of this parish: playing with blocks in the Sunday school room! It was extremely moving for me to touch the font where God gave me sanctifying grace, and implanted the gift of faith! I did not expect to start choking up as my wife and I quietly prayed an Our Father, a Hail Mary, and a Glory Be for the Pope's July intentions. This experience was such a gift!

I highly recommend taking some of the Year of Faith pamphlets at the tables and racks at the three entrances of our church. In particular, I would encourage *every parishioner at Mass this weekend* to take *two* copies of the new pamphlet on the Plenary Indulgence for the Year of Faith (especially if you don't know exactly what a plenary indulgence is, or how to gain one in the proper way). Keep one copy for yourself, for your edification, and give the other copy to someone within your family or to one of your friends or neighbors. There are several ways of gaining a plenary indulgence during the Year of Faith. If you were baptized in this Archdiocese, I encourage you to make a family day out of visiting the Church of your Baptism, and then to celebrate with a nice meal together. The Year of Faith ends on the Feast of Christ the King on November 24th (new calendar). In the loving words of Mother Angelica, "Don't miss the opportunity!"

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY

Luke 3:1-20 (Part 2)

St. Luke gives us fiery words from St. John the Baptist in chapter 3. They are simultaneously thrilling and challenging: thrilling, because they invite us to receive the grace of our blessed Lord, and challenging, because Jesus' coming necessitates conversion on our part, which is never easy. To the Jews who felt that they were on "God's good side" just because they were ethnically Jewish, St. John says that no one can be saved without real and genuine



conversion (vv. 7-9). Whether Jew or Gentile, all stand in need of God's forgiveness.

Herein lies a distinctly Lucan theme: salvation to the nations, i.e., the inclusion of non-Jews in a covenant relationship with the one, true God. The key to this relationship is repentance and baptism, which Christ offers us in and through His Church (see

Catechism of the Catholic Church nos. 1265-1266 to see a great explanation of the wondrous effects of Baptism). The grace of Baptism enables us to "produce good fruits as evidence of [our] repentance," as St. John teaches (v. 8). In other words, having been put back into right relationship with God, we can grow in our knowledge and love of Him, and imitate His life and love.

We should be careful, though, not to put off our growth in the knowledge and love of God. *Eternal* separation from God still remains a distinct possibility, should we choose to become separated from Him in this life and die in such a state. This is the reality of divine judgment, to which St. John refers when he describes the agricultural analogy of a farmer separating wheat from chaff (v. 17). Nevertheless, we can rejoice and take great comfort in that fact that God wants *everyone* to be saved (cf. 1 Tim. 2:4, John 3:16-17). He generously grants us many opportunities for repentance. It is not about being afraid of God, or thinking that He is "out to get us," as one of my professors, Dr. David Franks, explained in my moral theology class. Rather, it is about returning to our loving heavenly Father with true contrition. In view of this message, the crowds thought that St. John was the Messiah. He corrects them, and points to the supernatural grace that is present in Jesus (vv. 15-16), who is in fact the long-awaited Messiah, and whose baptism will effect justification and transformation (unlike his baptism, which is merely symbolic).

A unique feature of St. Luke's account of St. John the Baptist is the inclusion of detailed


instructions regarding the concrete living out of the message of repentance. The crowds understandably want to get in on God's grace, so they ask St. John, "What then should we do?" (v. 10). This should be our question, too. What specifically can I do that will allow me to make repentance and faith real and concrete in my life? Spiritual directors, and especially father confessors can help in this area. It does not hurt to be reminded of the Church's long-standing discipline of making our confession at least once a year.

In this passage, St. John specifically exhorts the people to distribute material goods, and not just in an occasional and relatively painless way, but in a way that costs us. The instruction, "Whoever who has two cloaks should share with the person who has none," means exercising abundant generosity toward those who have not. For tax collectors and soldiers, two groups of people who frequently found themselves immersed in immoral and dishonest practices and situations, St. John elicits a call to radical conversion, and a reassessment of the way they do their job.

In these specific instructions, another regularly occurring Lucan theme appears: God's concern for the poor and lowly. If we are following the homilies and speeches of Pope Francis, it is obvious enough that this is a major theme of his pontificate, and one which we in a country of great abundance would do well to pay heed. To what degree could we become more honest, just, and prudent in our several occupations? If we are striving to be as honest and godly as we can, let us continue to strive toward this high ideal. To what degree can we help the poor in a way that calls us to make sacrifices? If we are striving to be sacrificial and generous, let us continue to strive to become even more like Christ and the saints in this regard.




BLESSED EMPEROR KARL VON HABSURG
Thursday, October 17th, 2013:

On Thursday, October 17th, at 5:30 PM, we will welcome His Excellency, Don Teodoro de Faria, Bishop Emeritus of Funchal, Madeira, to our parish for the celebration of a Pontifical High Mass in Honor of Blessed Karl von Habsurg, Emperor of Austria and Apostolic King of Hungary, who died exiled on Madeira in 1922 and was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 2004. As bishop of the diocese in which Blessed Karl died, Bishop Faria has long been active in his cause for sainthood. It was Bishop Faria who formally presented the petition of beatification to Pope John Paul II.

Directly following the Mass, a reception will be held in the Lower Church Hall. Bishop de Faria will give a presentation about his book on Blessed Karl. Mr. Raymond de Souza, Knight of Malta and Catholic Apologist, will be accompanying Bishop de Faria and will also speak.

The Mass and the Reception are open to the public.



BENEDICTUM BOOK CLUB








OUR LADY OF MESOPOTAMIA MISSION: IRAQI CATHOLICS





LATIN MASS TEXTS: Traditional Propers for the XXI Sunday after Pentecost

INTROIT: *Esther 13: 9, 10-11* All things are in Thy will, O Lord; and there is none that can resist Thy will: for Thou hast made all things, heaven and earth, and all things that are under the cope of heaven: Thou art Lord of all. *Psalms 118: 1* Blessed are the undefiled in the way; who walk in the law of the Lord. V. Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Lord, we pray Thee, keep Thy household the Church in continual godliness; that through Thy protection it may be free from all adversities, and devoutly given to good works, to the glory of Thy holy name. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: *Ephesians 6: 10-17* Brethren: Be strengthened in the Lord, and in the might of His power. Put you on the armour of God, that you may be able to stand against the deceits of the devil. For our wrestling is not against flesh and blood, but against principalities and powers, against the rulers of the world of this darkness, against the spirits of wickedness in the high places. Therefore, take unto you the armour of God, that you may be able to resist in the evil day, and to stand in all things perfect; stand therefore having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of justice, and your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; in all things taking the shield of faith, wherewith you may be able to extinguish all the fiery darts of the most wicked one. And take unto you the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit which is the word of God.

GRADUAL: *Psalms 89: 1-2* Lord, Thou hast been our refuge from generation to generation. V. Before the mountains were made, or the earth and the world was formed; from eternity and to eternity Thou art God.

ALLELUIA: *Psalms 113: 1* Alleluia, alleluia. V. When Israel went out of Egypt, the house of Jacob from a barbarous people. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: *Matthew 18: 23-35* At that time Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: The kingdom of Heaven is likened to a king, who would take an account of his servants. And when he had begun to take the account, one was brought to him that owed him ten thousand talents: and as he had not wherewith to pay it, his lord commanded that he should be sold, and his wife and children, and all that he had, and payment to be made. But that servant falling down, besought him saying: Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And the lord of that servant, being moved with pity, let him go, and forgave him the debt. But when that servant was gone out, he found one of his fellow-servants that owed him a hundred pence: and laying hold of him, he throttled him, saying: Pay what thou owest. And his fellow-servant falling down besought him, saying: Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And he would not; but went and cast him into prison till he paid the debt. Now his fellow-servants, seeing what was done, were very much grieved; and they came and told their lord all that was done. Then his lord called him, and saith to him: Thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all the debt, because thou besoughtest me; shouldst not thou then have had compassion also on thy fellow-servant, even as I had compassion on thee? And his lord being angry delivered him to the torturers until he paid all the debt. So also shall my heavenly Father do to you, if you forgive not every one his brother from your hearts.



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
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
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
