

### **Pastor's Note**

### THE GENTLE RULE OF CHRIST

Today, according to the 1962 Missal, we celebrate the Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King. (In the 1970 Missal Christ the King is the last Sunday of the Year before Advent.) The Feast emphasizes the sovereignty of Christ over human society in both its temporal and its spiritual aspects. Rather than being a tyranny, this Kingship of Christ is the embodiment of all the aspirations of people for a more just social

order and peace. It is reflected by the conduct of good and worthy leaders in the exercise of their office. Such was Blessed Karl I of Austria-Hungary (1887-1922), who was beatified by Pope John Paul II in October, 2004.

Karl I became the Emperor (the Kaiser) of the Austro-Hungarian Empire at the end of 1916. At the time he ascended the thrones of Austria and Hungary the Empire was caught up in the Great War we know as World War I (1914-1918). Austria-Hungary was allied with Germany, Bulgaria and Turkey—the "Central Powers" against England, France, Russia, Italy, and other countries—the "Allies". (In the spring of 1917 the USA joined the war on the side of the Allies.) The war ended in 1918 with the defeat of the Central Powers. Kaiser Karl was forced into exile with his family. After he made two unsuccessful attempts to reclaim the Hungarian throne in 1921, the British exiled him to the Portuguese island of Madeira where he died in 1922.

This past Thursday, October 17th, we had the special event of a Pontifical High Mass celebrated in honor of Blessed Karl. (Photographs of the event taken by parishioner Paul Eldridge are in this week's bulletin.) The Mass was celebrated by the Bishop Emeritus of Funchal, Madeira, Don Teodoro de Faria, who had been instrumental in advancing the cause for sainthood and who presented the dossier to Pope John Paul II at the Mass of Beatification on October 3rd, 2004. Don De Faria brought with him copies of the English-translation of a commemorative lecture he gave on the 90th Anniversary of Karl I's death: "Charles of Austria. Remembering His Death in Madeira...90 Years Later."

Over and above the personal integrity with which the Austrian Kaiser lived out his Catholic life, there are some things we can highlight as examples of his rule as a Christian trying to further Christ's Social Kingship.

The first is his rôle in trying to bring an end to the war. Karl was 29 at his accession to the

(Pastor's Note: continued from page 3...) to the two thrones of the Dual Monarchy of Austria and Hungary. On the first day of his reign he issued a proclamation: "I want to do everything in my power to put an end, as soon as possible, to the horrors and sacrifices of war, to grant my people the material benefits of peace." The failure of his peace efforts is another story altogether of the culpability of individuals who were blinded by national chauvinism, personal ambition, or narrowminded mistrust as well as a callousness to the sufferings of others. In the words of Anatole France: "[Kaiser Karl] was the only decent man who appeared in the course of the First World War.'

While the war did go on Kaiser Karl refused to allow the barbarities of war to have free rein, as did the other countries. He opposed the use of poison gas; he would not allow the bombing of Italian cities; he forbade retaliatory measures against the civilians of enemy countries; he saw to a more human treatment of the prisoners of war.

On the homefront he accepted for himself and his family the same hardships endured by the general population. He organized soup kitchens, and the horses of the Imperial court were used to deliver firewood in Vienna during the winter cold.

Even under war-time conditions Kaiser Karl sought to implement the social and political reforms underlying Catholic social doctrine. For example, he established a Ministry for Social Welfare and a Ministry of Public Health, enacted youth welfare laws and other legislation in favor of the working classes. He had a particular disgust for men who abused their high office for personal unethical gain. To this end he made the highest offices honorary, without a salary, while raising the wages of the court employees.

He also distinguished himself as a ruler by intervening to right wrongs and exercise clemency. On July 2nd, 1917, he granted a general amnesty to people who had fallen victim to the many injustices perpetrated by war-time military courts throughout the Empire.


Finally, Kaiser Karl put the general welfare of his people above the protection of his own personal well-being. In order to avoid bloodshed, he withdrew from power in Vienna in November, 1918. Later, in October of 1921, for the same reason, he held back from attacking Budapest with his army and so he was outmaneuvered by the treacherous regent who took him captive and handed him over to the British. He died impoverished a few months later on the island of Madeira, having forgiven all his enemies, and praying and offering up his sufferings for the peoples of his former Empire.

The father of Pope John Paul II, also Karol Wotyla, was a noncommissioned officer in the Austrian Imperial Army during World War I. As Pope, John Paul II referred to Kaiser Karl as "my father's sovereign" in a meeting with the Empress Zita (she died in 1989). Kaiser Karl was the last "Blessed" pronounced by Pope John Paul II before his own death in April, 2005.

Kaiser Karl's life is an example both of personal honor in a high station of life, and in an exercise of authority which truly bears the mark of "the gentle rule of Christ".

### **KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH**



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 3:23-38

**B**ave you ever done genealogical research? If you haven't, have you ever wondered about your family tree, or at least been intrigued by relics of your family history somewhere in the attic, or by stories

(over)



you've heard while talking to a relative? For most of us, this can be a fascinating venture that we take up at least once in our life, if not more than once. When we investigate our family history, we develop a sense of identity, and hopefully, a sense of legitimate pride. This is the kind of perspective we can bring to the reading of a Biblical genealogy.

Although it might seem boring to read St. Luke's account of Jesus' genealogy (and perhaps off-putting, since we struggle to pronounce 2/3 of the names), I think we might all be surprised by the handful of the people whose names we *could* recognize and about whom we could say a few words.

Unlike St. Matthew's genealogy (cf. Mt.l:l-17), which begins with Abraham, and traces the Davidic line through many of the Davidic kings, St. Luke traces it backwards through a different Davidic line (David had many children, not all of whom were kings). Unlike St. Matthew, St. Luke traces Jesus' line all the way back to Adam. It is generally agreed that St. Matthew's genealogy traces Jesus' family history through St. Joseph's side of the family, and that St. Luke's traces it through Mary's side. We should also note that not every single g eneration in St. Luke's genealogy is mentioned, as the Navarre Study Bible explains, just the figures he thought were most worthy of mention. Additionally, while St. Luke's genealogy traces Mary's line, it still begins by mentioning St. Joseph, because he was Jesus' foster-father, and the head of the family.

Why trace the line backwards to Adam? St. Luke's Gospel often emphasizes Jesus' concern for the poor and the lowly, as well as his mission to bring salvation to all the Gentiles (non-Jews). By linking Jesus with Adam, the father of all men, he demonstrates Jesus' solidarity with the whole human race, as several commentators note. St. Luke was also a missionary companion of St. Paul, so it is also plausible to guess that he might be drawing a comparison between Jesus and Adam, based on the teaching of St. Paul in Romans 5:12-21.

In this passage, St. Paul identifies Christ as a "type" of Adam. Just as original sin spread to everyone through Adam, eternal life is given to all through Jesus, who "reverses the curse," so to speak. Thus, God's salvation is available for all of us, regardless of ethnic background.

What else can we learn from a genealogy that might apply to our lives today? I heard an Orthodox priest once preaching on St. Matthew's genealogy, and he told the congregation that we can see herein Jesus' solidarity with sinful mankind, because there are several people mentioned in the genealogy who were not saintly all the time, or even saintly at all. None of our family trees are perfect, either. We can read about the scandals and the disobedience of certain of Jesus' ancestors in the Old Testament, not because we want to emulate these occurrences, but rather to learn from them, so as to become holy. God never approved of immorality, because it always ended up harming both the victims and the perpetrators. Nevertheless, He always loved his people unconditionally. The same remains true today, regardless of how much Judeo-Christian morality is spurned in the public square. St. Paul said it best in Romans 5:8: "But God proves His love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us."

When we see Jesus' genealogy, we are reminded that God was continually faithful to Israel, even in its ups and downs, and that He sent the Messiah, just as He promised he would. When we consider this, we should be prompted to think about the ways in which God has been faithful to us in our own ups and downs. We can even seek to discern God's providence in our lives right now, whatever the circumstances. He never abandoned Israel- far from it! He gave them Jesus, after a long history that showed no merit or worthiness for this divine grace. Likewise, we can humbly and gratefully ponder the love of God that is always available for us, even when we least deserve it. *Deo Gratias*!



# LATIN MASS TEXTS: Traditional Propers for the Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King

INTROIT: Apocalypse 5:12; 1:26 The Lamb that was slain is worthy to receive power and divinity and wisdom and strength and honor; to Him be glory and empire for ever and ever. *Psalm 71:1 Give* to the King, O God, Thy justice, and to the King's Son Thy judgment. *V. Glory* be to the Father...

COLLECT Almighty everlasting God, who in Thy beloved Son, King of the whole world, hast willed to restore all things anew; grant in Thy mercy that all the families of nations, rent asunder by the wound of sin, may be subjected to His most gentle rule. Who with Thee liveth...

EPISTLE: Colossians 1:12-20 Brethren: Giving thanks to God the Father, who hath made us worthy to be partakers of the lot of the saints in light: who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath transferred us into the kingdom of the Son of His love, in whom we have redemption through His blood, the remission of sins; who is the image of the invisible God, the first-born of every creature: for in Him were all things created in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominations, or principalities or powers. All things were created by Him and in Him; and His is before all, and by Him all things consist. And He is the Head of the Body the Church, who is the beginning, the first-born from the dead, that in all things, He may hold the primacy: because in Him, it hath well pleased the Father that all fullness should dwell; and through Him to reconcile all things unto Himself, making peace through the Blood of His Cross, both as to the things on earth, and the things that are in heaven, in Jesus Christ our Lord.

**GRADUAL: Psalm 71: 8. 11.** He shall rule from sea to sea, and from the river to the ends of the earth. *V.* And all kings shall adore Him, all nations shall serve Him.

ALLELUIA: Alleluia, alleluia. V. His power shall be an everlasting power, which shall not be taken away; and His kingdom a kingdom that shall not decay. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: John 18:33-37 **A**t that time, Pilate said to Jesus: Art Thou the King of the Jesus? Jesus answered: Sayest thou this thing of thyself, or have others told it thee of Me? Pilate answered: Am I a Jew? Thine own nation and the chief priests have delivered Thee up to me: what hast Thou done? Jesus answered: My kingdom is not of this world. If My kingdom were of this world, My servants would certainly strive that I should not be delivered to the Jesus; but now My kingdom is not from hence. Pilate therefore said to Him: Art Thou a King then? Jesus answered: Thou sayest that I am a King. For this was I born, and for this came I into the world, that I should give testimony to the truth. Everyone that is of the truth, heareth My voice.






