#### **Pastor's Note**

## FROM CHRISTMAS TO CANDLEMAS

Dur Sunday Mass today is superseded by the last feast-day of the Christmas cycle. February 2nd, the 40th day after Christmas, is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord and the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On that day Mary and Joseph went to the great Temple in Jerusalem and made the offering of their first born Son Jesus according to the dictates of the Law of Moses. Mary also performed the ritual purification prescribed by the Jewish religious law. February 2nd thus marks the end of the Christmas event we have been celebrating since Christmas Eve on December 24th.

An important part of the February 2nd liturgy is the blessing and procession of candles, which we have today as part of our 10:30 AM Latin Mass. (See the English translation on pp. 6-7.) The lighted tapers which the faithful carry are symbolic of the Light of Christ. They also recall the light of faith in the individual soul. At Baptism, we become members of Christ's Mystical Body. The lighted candle given to the newly baptized person as part of the baptismal ceremony represents that person's sharing in Christ's own life and His pledge of life everlasting.

The carrying of lighted tapers during Mass is distinct for the Mass of Candlemas, but at one time every Mass was a Candle Mass, because baptized Christians carried lighted candles during the celebration of Mass. The other liturgy during the year when we see lighted tapers in the hands of the faithful is during the Paschal Vigil on Easter Eve. So, we may make a connection between the lights of Candlemas to mark the end of the Christmas Cycle and the lights of Easter Eve which proclaim Christ risen from the dead.

### EXTERNAL SOLEMNITY OF OUR PARISH FEAST AND ST. BLAISE

Next Sunday, February 9th, we will celebrate the external solemnity of our parish's Patronal Feast, The Apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary at Lourdes, which feast occurs on February 11th. February 3rd is the Feast of St. Blaise and the day of the traditional blessing of

the throats with the St. Blaise candles. The St. Blaise blessing will be offered at the parish daily Masses on the feast itself, and then it will be offered after all of our parish Sunday



Masses next weekend as well.

# KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH





GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 6:20-26

Daving chosen his twelve disciples and having healed many, Jesus commences a long series of teachings. Often termed the "Sermon on the Plain," it parallels his Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5-7.

The first part of this sermon begins with four beatitudes and four parallel woes. In his commentary on Luke, Robert Tannehill notes how St. Luke forecasts the content of this passage with themes of "reversal" in the Magnificat of Our Lady (cf. 1:46-55). In other words, those who are actually blessed are those who are the lowest in society, whereas the powerful are rejected.

The word beatitude means "blessedness" or "favor." The Latin root, *beatus*, also means "happy." Thus, to be blessed means to enjoy the happiness of God's favor in your life. This is precisely what we mean when we say to Our Lady, "Blessed are you among women." She enjoys the happiness of God's blessing in her life, because she welcomes His grace with an open heart.

Each of us who us baptized has experienced this blessedness (for most of us, unconsciously) in a preeminent way, by becoming children of the Father in the Son (cf. Eph. 1:3-14). But the journey should not stagnate after the font; Christ teaches us how to

nourish the grace of this first blessing/favor, so that we will come to enjoy the unending happiness of heaven. Thus, in these four beatitudes, Jesus is telling us how to be *truly* happy as we make our way to heaven. Conversely, the four woes constitute a solemn warning against the causes for great unhappiness and sorrow.

Jesus says in v. 20 that we are blessed/happy if we are "poor," because "the kingdom of God is [ours]." No one promotes or views poverty as an enviable way of life, so what can Jesus possibly mean? Poverty, in itself, is not part of God's plan for man, but insofar as those who experience hardship recognize their dependence upon God for all things (especially the necessity of His divine grace for eternal life), they are indeed citizens of a heavenly kingdom where they are truly loved, where their dignity is upheld for the precious gift it is, and where a place is being prepared for them (cf. Jn. 14:1-3).

Conversely, Jesus declares woe for the "rich" in v. 24, because they "have received [their] consolation." Those who idolize wealth, or rely too much on transitory comforts oftentimes fail to invest in virtues of humility and self-giving solidarity for the poor. Their comforts will not last. They will not enter the kingdom of God, as long as they do not possess, at the very least, an "interior" poverty that acknowledges the sovereignty of God in their lives, and the needs of their fellow man, as the Ignatius Study Bible notes.

In v. 21, Jesus blesses those who are "hungry," because they "will be satisfied." Hunger is a great social problem, so why should the hungry be happy? Jesus makes a solemn promise to them that their needs will be met. One of St. Luke's recurring themes is that of promise and fulfillment. When Jesus makes a promise, we can be sure that He will make good on it. As one commentator has noted, the Church became a major fulfillment of this promise. As St. Luke shows us in Acts 2:45, and 4:34-35, the Apostolic Church cared greatly for the needs of the poor.

In v. 25, Jesus warns those "who are filled now," because they "will be hungry." Jesus warns the "haves" about the justice that awaits them for failing to provide for the "have-nots." They will experience in eternity the hunger that they failed to satiate for the needy on earth. If we read Jesus' parable about the Last Judgment in Mt. 25:31-46, we find the same

sobering teaching.

In v. 21, Jesus also blesses those who are "weeping," promising them laughter. In this beatitude, Jesus lauds the virtue of contrition. Genuine sorrow for sin, springing from pure love for God and man, opens the soul to the joy of reconciliation. Conversely, in v. 25, those who "laugh" at sin, who maliciously mock the suffering of the poor, or simply feel indifferent toward their suffering, or who carry on through life in a hedonist fashion- these will receive a jarring surprise when they enter Hell, on account of mortal sin, or pass through Purgatory on their way to Heaven, due to a lack of contrition and reparation for venial sin. They will "grieve and weep."

Finally, Jesus blesses those who are persecuted for His sake in vv. 22-23. He tells them to "rejoice," because their "reward will be great in heaven." He equates their suffering with that of the venerable prophets of old. The blessing of being persecuted is the consolation of being in the Truth. Truth endures, whereas deception leads to Hell. In every age, the world upholds "false prophets" who condone its reprehensible behavior. "If it feels good, do it." This is what all the false prophets in the Old Testament said. The true prophets were persecuted, however, because they stood firmly in the Truth, which was the opposite of the popular message. For further meditation on this topic, I highly recommend reading Christ's messages to the churches of Asia Minor in the Book of Revelation, in which he reiterates his promise of eternal life for those who "conquer" (cf. Rev. 2-3).

#### THE PURIFICATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY: CANDLEMAS DAY

The Blessing of the Candles:

V. The Lord be with you. R. And with thy spirit.


Holy Lord, Father almighty, everlasting God, who hast created all things out of nothing, and by Thy command hast causedthis liquid to become perfect wax by the labour of bees: and who, on this day didst fulfil the petition of the righteous man, Simeon: we humbly entreat Thee, that by the invocation of Thy most holy Name and through the intercession of Blessed Mary ever Virgin whose feast is today devoutly observed, and by the prayers of all Thy Saints, Thou wouldst vouchsafe to bless and sanctify these candles for the service of men and for the health of their bodies and souls, whether on land or on sea: and that Thou wouldst hear from Thy holy heaven, and from the throne of Thy Majesty the voices of this Thy people, who desire to carry them in their hands with honour, and to sing Your praises; and that You would look with favour on all who call upon You, whom You have redeemed ith the precious blood of Your Son, who being God, lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Ghost, world without end. R. Amen.

Almighty and everlasting God, who on this day didst present Thine only-begotten Son in Thy holy temple to be received in the arms of holy Simeon: we humbly entreat Thy clemency, that Thou wouldst vouchsafe to bless and sanctify and to kindle with the light of Thy heavenly benediction these candles, which we, Thy servants, desire to receive and to bear lighted in the honour of Thy Name: that, by offering them to Thee our Lord God, being worthily inflamed with the holy fire of Thy most sweet charity, we may deserve to be presented in the holy temple of Thy glory. Through the same our Lord. R. Amen.

Lord Jesus Christ, the true Light who enlightenest every man that cometh into this world: pour forth Thy blessing uponthese candles, and sanctify them with the light of Thy grace, and mercifully grant, that as these lights enkindled with visible fire dispel the darkness of night, so our hearts illumined by invisible fire, that is, by the splendour of the Holy Spirit, may be free from the blindness of all vice, that the eye of our mind being cleansed, we may be able to discern what is pleasing to Thee and profitable to our salvation; so that after the perilous darkness of this life we may deserve to attain to never-failing light: through Thee, O Christ Jesus, Saviour of the world, who in the perfect Trinity, livest and reignest. R. Amen.

Lord Jesus Christ, who appearing on this day among men in the substance of our flesh, wast presented by Thy parents in the temple: whom the venerable and aged Simeon, illuminated by the light of Thy Spirit, recognized, received into his arms, and blessed: mercifully grant that, enlightened and taught by the grace of the same Holy Ghost, we may truly acknowledge Thee and faithfully love Thee; Who with God the Father. R. Amen.

Almighty and everlasting God, who by Thy servant Moses didst command thepurest oil to be prepared for lamps to burn continuously before Thee: vouchsafe to pour forth the grace of Thy blessing upon these candles: that they may so afford us light outwardly that by Thy gift, the gift of Thy Spirit may never be wanting inwardly to our minds. Through our Lord. R. Amen.



ANTIPHON After the distribution of blessed candles this Antiphon is Umen \* ad reve-la-ti-ónem génti-um : et gló-ri-am sung: Arise, O Lord, help us and deliver us for Thy Name's sake. Ps. 43. 2. We have heard, O God, with our ears: our fathers have declared to us. Glory be to the Father. Arise, O Lord.

COLLECT: We beseech Thee, O Lord, hearken unto Thy people, and grant that by the light of Thy grace, we may inwardly attain to those things which Thou grantest us outwardly to venerate by this yearly observance. Through Christ our Lord. R. Amen.

#### THE PROCESSION WITH LIGHTED CANDLES

Adorn thy bridal-chamber, O Sion, and welcome Christ the King: with loving embrace greet Mary who is the very gate of heaven; for she bringeth to thee the glorious King of the new light: remaining ever a Virgin yet she bearest in her arms the Son begotten before the day-star: even the Child, whom Simeon taking into his arms, declared to the peoples to be the Lord of life and death, and the Saviour of the world.

Someon received an answer from the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord; and when they brought the Child into the temple, he took Him into His arms, and blessed God, and said: Now dost Thou dismiss Thy servant, O Lord, in peace. When His parents brought in the Child Jesus, to do for Him according to the custom of the law, he took Him in his arms.

And the sacrifice of Juda and of Jerusalem shall please the Lord, as in the days of old, and in the ancient years; saith the Lord almighty. And behold there was a man in Jerusalem named Simeon, and this man was just and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Ghost was in him: and he had received an answer from the Holy Ghost, that he should not see death, before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. And he came by the Spirit into the temple. And when His parents brought in the Child Jesus, to do for Him according to the custom of the law, he also took Him into his arms, and blessed God, and said: Now Thou dost dismiss Thy servant, O Lord, according to Thy word in peace; because my eyes have seen Thy salvation, which Thou hast prepared before the face of all peoples; a light to the revelation of the Gentiles and the glory of Thy people Israel. (Luke 2:22-32)

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


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
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
