THE CATHOLIC HOLY DAYS

It was Pope St. Pius X who radically revised the calendar of Catholic Holy Days of Obligation during his reign at the beginning of the 20th century. Up until then, one-tenth of the year was dedicated to days on which the Catholic faithful were bound to attend Mass and rest from servile work, outside of all Sundays (holiday=holy-day). As a concession to the pressures of modern working conditions and the secularization of laws and customs, the number of Holy Days of Obligation for the Universal Church was reduced to ten.

The ten were as follows: **January 1st (Octave Day of Christmas); January 6th (Epiphany of the Lord); March 19th (St. Joseph); Ascension Thursday; Corpus Christi; June 29th (Holy Apostles Peter & Paul); August 15th (Assumption of Our Lady); November 1st (All Saints Day); December 8th (Immaculate Conception of Mary); and December 25th (Christmas Day).**


No longer Holy Days of Obligation were: Easter Monday and Easter Tuesday; Pentecost Monday and Pentecost Tuesday; Finding of the Holy Cross (May 3rd); Purification of Mary (Feb. 2nd); Annunciation (March 25th); Nativity of Mary (September 8th); St. Michael's Day (September 29th); Nativity of John the Baptist (June 24th); the Primary Feast of each Apostle (e.g., St. Matthew on September 21st; St. John on December 27th); St. Stephen (December 26th); Holy Innocents (December 28th), and St. Anne (July 26th). Particular Holy Days of Obligation were applied also to the national patron (e.g., St. Patrick's Day in Ireland), the Patronal Feast of the local Church (St. Patrick in Boston), and the Titular of the parish church (for us that would be, the Apparition of Our Lady at Lourdes, February 11th).

In the United States of America, the Bishops reduced the number of Holy Days of Obligation outside of Sunday to six: **January 1st, Ascension Thursday, August 15th, November 1st, December 8th, and December 25th.** At present, a century after Pius X's reform of the Holy Days of Obligation, we are in danger of losing that distinctive mark of Catholic identity in the USA, which our Holy Days represented: something that stood out as affirming the precedence of sacred times and seasons over the secular. Recently, in many parts of the country Ascension day has been moved to the Seventh Sunday of Easter, and the other Days of obligation do not oblige if they fall on a Saturday or Monday.

Can we not see the re-invigoration of the communal observance of the Catholic Holy Days outside of Sunday as another means of evangelization of the larger culture, a culture which is addicted to "total work", a culture which—though it may promote the diversion of vacations—no more knows what it is to celebrate a holiday?

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 9:51-62)

The middle of chapter nine marks a distinct transition point in St. Luke's Gospel. Jesus gradually makes his way to Jerusalem for the events of Holy Week, having twice foretold His Passion. His first stop includes a Samaritan village, whose people

refuse Him when they learn of His destination (vv. 52-53). Why such a cold reaction to Jesus?

Unfortunately, the reason for their refusal is a deeply seated ethnic dispute. The central point of contention was that the Samaritans did not acknowledge Jerusalem as the only legitimate locus of sacrificial worship. This is brought to the fore in John 4, when Jesus talks with the Samaritan woman at the well about what constitutes true worship (cf. Jn. 4:4-26). Thus, it is likely that the Samaritans in this passage did not feel that Jesus represented their social and religious interests, since He was headed for Jerusalem. Would that they could have known that Jesus was going to Jerusalem to offer the perfect sacrifice of Himself: the ultimate worship "in spirit and in truth," far exceeding the sacrifices of the Temple on Mt. Sion or those of the rival Samaritan shrine on Mt. Gerazim.

In vv. 54-55, Sts. James and John (the "sons of

thunder") ask Jesus to bring a fiery and climactic end to these villagers, for their obstinate refusal of Jesus. Jesus rebukes them, manifesting His meekness in the face of blasphemous rejection. He also exemplifies His earlier teaching in chapter 9 about how to deal with rejection in apostolic work: shaking the dust from one's feet, and simply moving on to the next town (cf. 9:5).

As they journey on, we hear three conversations about the recurring theme of discipleship. The first exchange (vv. 57-58) involves a man who promises unconditional loyalty. Jesus replies by identifying the hardship of itinerant ministry, the implication being that he should be sure to count the cost. In the second exchange (vv. 59-60), Jesus calls someone to follow Him. The man answers with a legitimate excuse (burying his father), but Jesus' stark response ("Let the dead bury their dead") suggests that the man may have used it as a front for avoiding apostolic work. In the third exchange (vv. 61-62), someone makes an excuse for delaying his response to the Lord's summons. Again, while his excuse has some legitimacy ("first let me say farewell to my family"), Jesus reveals the underlying hesitancy: "No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God."

Each of these exchanges involves persons whom Jesus called to follow Him in a radical fashion, as companions in his traveling ministry. But what are we to learn for our own discipleship, since most of us are not called to be itinerant missionaries? There are two salient themes for us in each exchange: prioritizing correctly and being committed. Jesus must come first, *even before our families*, as certain commentaries highlight. In effect, this is no different from the first commandment: "You shall not have other gods besides me" (cf. Ex. 20:3). In a culture which is increasingly anti-Christian and permissive, our loyalty to Jesus needs to be firm. Thus, for example, we cannot afford to compromise Catholic moral teaching. In our own lives and families, and in our conversations with those of differing views, we need to be convinced of the saving truth of the Church's teaching, and proclaim it with the meekness, civility, boldness, and joy of Christ Himself.

WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY: "THE GOSPEL OF LUKE"



THE HOLY APOSTLES PETER AND PAUL

INTROIT: Acts 12: 11 Now I know in very deed, that the Lord hath sent His angel, and hath delivered me out of the hand of Herod, and from all the expectation of the people of the Jews. *Psalm 138: 1-2* Lord, Thou hast proved me and known me: Thou hast known my sitting down and my rising up. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT O God, who hast made holy this day with the martyrdom of Thine apostles Peter and Paul; grant that Thy Church may in all things follow the precepts of those from whom it first received the faith. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Acts of the Apostles 12: 1-11 In those days, Herod the king stretched forth his hand to afflict some of the Church: and he killed James, the brother of John, with the sword; and seeing that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to take up Peter also. Now it was in the days of the azymes: and when he had apprehended him, he cast him into prison, delivering him to four files of soldiers to be kept, intending after the Pasch to bring him forth to the people. Peter therefore was kept in prison; but prayer was made without ceasing by the Church unto God for him. And when Herod would have brought him forth, the same night Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, bound with two chains; and the keepers before the door kept the prison. And behold, an angel of the Lord stood by him, and a light shined in the room; and he striking Peter on the side, raised him up, saying: Arise quickly. And the chains fell off from his hands; and the angel said to him: Gird thyself, and put on thy sandals. And he did so. And he said to him: Cast thy garments about thee, and follow me. And going out, he followed him: and he knew not that it was true which was done by the angel; but he thought he saw a vision. And passing through the first and the second ward, they came to the iron gate that leadeth to the city, which of itself opened to them; and going out, they passed on through one street, and immediately the angel departed from him. And Peter coming to himself, said: Now I know in very deed that the Lord hath sent His angel, and hath delivered me out of the hand of Herod, and from all the expectation of the people of the Jews.

GOSPEL: Matthew 16: 13-19 **At** that time, Jesus came into the quarters of Caesarea Philippi, and He asked His disciples, saying: whom do men say that the Son of man is? But they said: Some, John the Baptist, and other some Elias, and others Jeremias, or one of the prophets. Jesus saith to them: But whom do you say that I am? Simon Peter answered, and said: Thou art Christ, the Son of the living God. And Jesus answering, said to him: Blessed art Thou, Simon Bar-Jona, because flesh and blood hath not revealed it to thee, but My Father who is in heaven: and I say to thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build My Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it; and I will give to thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt bind upon earth, it shall be bound also in heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth, it shall be loosed also in heaven.
