JULY IS THE MONTH OF THE MOST PRECIOUS BLOOD OF JESUS

ALONE WITH YOUR THOUGHTS?

Recently *The Boston Globe* ran a front-page story on a study which found that people do not really enjoy spending even ten minutes alone with their thoughts (“*Just Sit and Think? Perish the Thought: Many in Study Pine for Distraction*”, July 4th, 2014). According to this research done at the University of Virginia: “Many people chose to administer painful electric shocks to themselves rather than sit in quiet contemplation.”

“I was surprised that people find themselves such bad company,” said Jonathan Schooler, a psychology professor from the University of California, Santa Barbara, who was not involved in the research. “It seems that the average person doesn’t seem capable of

generating a sufficiently interesting train of thought to prevent them from being miserable with themselves.”


In one of the experiments 55 participants were told to sit in a room and think for 15 minutes. If they wanted, they also had the option to shock themselves by pressing a button, feeling a jolt resembling a severe static shock on their ankle. To the researchers’ surprise, two-thirds of the men and a quarter of the women chose to shock themselves during the 15 minute be-alone-with-your-thoughts period. One person pressed the button 190 times. “*The researchers were stunned. People were choosing an unpleasant sensation instead of freely cogitating on whatever they wanted.*”

From our Catholic, spiritual point-of-view we might look on this story as a sign of what happens when human souls have little to no interior prayer life and so they have great difficulty entering into themselves, even on the human level of just calming down and trying to maintain an equilibrium. Reading this story I recalled an incident from my seminary days when one of the faculty priests told a group of us (in his characteristic growling fashion) that the Seminary program was failing us because “*it doesn’t teach a man how to sit in a room alone with himself.*”

Another perspective we can take from the French supercentenarian Madame Jeanne Calment, who lived from 1873-1997. She died at the age of 122, the oldest person in world history for whom there is sure documentation. In an interview towards the end of her extraordinarily long-life, she was asked how she spent her days now that she was enfeebled and in a nursing home. “*I think, I dream,*” she replied, “*I go over my life. I am never bored.*”

SCRIPTURE STUDY COLUMN



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 10:21-14)

Having just responded to the report of the seventy-two disciples, Jesus makes a joyful prayer to the Father for their ministry. As St. Luke relates, "At that very moment He rejoiced in the Holy Spirit and said, 'I give You praise, Father, Lord of heaven and earth,

for although You have hidden these things from the wise and the learned you have revealed them to the childlike'" (cf. 10:21). We see here the typical Lucan pattern of reversal. In other words, those who seem least important become vessels of great graces, while those deemed most important in society do not measure up. This passage echoes our Lady's *Magnificat*: "He has thrown down the rulers from their thrones but lifted up the lowly" (cf. 1:52).

Too often we fall prey to the temptation to measure ourselves by worldly standards: conventional opinions of beauty, symbols of financial prosperity, aggressive and/or passive-aggressive behaviors that subjugate others. None of these have merit in God's eyes. Intimate friendship with God is really what is of value.

Jesus concludes His prayer by affirming that His disciples' knowledge of divine revelation, their intimate relationship with God, is His Father's

"gracious will" (v. 21). Do we consider what God's will is for us? For some, this may be a daily concern. For others, it may be only an occasional spiritual stirring. Our faith teaches us overwhelmingly that God is concerned with the most weighty matters of our lives, as well as the most minute details. Above all else, however, God wants us to enjoy loving communion with Him, which entails knowing His revelation in Christ. In the words of the Act of Faith: "I believe in...all the truths that the Holy Catholic Church doth teach because *Thou has revealed them.*" Inextricably linked with this prayer are these words from the Act of Love: "I love Thee above all things...because *Thou art infinitely good, and worthy of all my love*" These prayers express God's will for us at all times, within all of the particulars of our lives, and without qualifications.

Having concluded His prayer, Jesus then makes a bold claim, similar to several passages in St. John's Gospel: "All things have been handed over to me by My Father. No one knows who the Son is except the Father, and who the Father is except the Son and anyone to whom the Son wishes to reveal Him" (v. 22). Jesus' consubstantial unity with the Father is crucially important. His divine sonship is the basis for the communion we hope to enjoy with the Father in the beatific vision (cf. Jn. 1:12-14). Only the One who enjoys union with God by nature has the capacity to share divine life with others (cf. CCC no. 460). St. Athanasius was vehement in his defense of this truth against the Arians who denied Jesus' divinity. As he taught (and as the Church teaches), only divinity can bridge the infinite metaphysical gap between God and sinful man. Thus, the Arian position necessarily implies that man does not yet share in divine life. One can quickly see, then, that holding to the Catholic position is critically relevant for salvation!

The possession of this revelation is a great blessing, as Jesus explains to His disciples: "Blessed are the eyes that see what you see...many prophets and kings desired to see what you see, but did not see it" (vv. 23-24). Let us thank the Lord for giving us access to the Father. Let us likewise pray for those in our daily sphere of influence who do not know Christ, that they may share in this same blessing.


WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY: "THE GOSPEL OF LUKE"



SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: *Psalm 27: 8-9* The Lord is the strength of His people, and the protector of the salvation of His anointed: save, O Lord, Thy people, and bless Thy inheritance, and rule them for ever. *Psalm 27: 8-9* Unto Thee will I cry, O Lord: O my God, be not Thou silent to me, lest if Thou be silent to me, I become like them that go down into the pit. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT O God of all power and might, who art the giver of all good things; implant in our hearts the love of Thy name, increase in us true religion, nourish us with all goodness and by Thy mercy keep us in the same. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: *Romans 6: 3-II* Brethren, all we who are baptized in Christ Jesus are baptized in His death. For we are buried together with Him by baptism unto death; that as Christ is risen from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall also be in the likeness of His resurrection. Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin may be destroyed, and that we may serve sin no longer. For he that is dead is justified from sin. Now if ye be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall live also together with Christ. Knowing that Christ, rising again from the dead, dieth now no more, death shall no more have dominion over Him. For in that He died to sin He died once; but in that He liveth, He liveth unto God. So do you also reckon yourselves to be dead indeed to sin.

GRADUAL: *Psalm 89: 13, 1* Return, O Lord, a little; and be entreated in favour of Thy servants. *V.* Lord, Thou hast been our refuge from generation to generation. **ALLELUIA:** *Psalm 30: 2-3* Alleluia, alleluia. *V.* In Thee, O Lord, have I hoped, let me never be confounded: deliver me in Thy justice, and release me; bow down Thy ear to me, make haste to deliver me. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: *Mark 8: 1-9* **At** that time, when there was a great multitude with Jesus, and had nothing to eat, calling His disciples together, He saith to them: I have compassion on the multitude, for behold they have now been with Me three days, and have nothing to eat; and if I shall send them away fasting to their home, they will faint in the way: for some of them came from afar off. And His disciples answered Him: From whence can any one fill them here with bread in the wilderness? And He asked them: How many loaves have ye? Who said: Seven. And He commanded the people to sit down on the ground. And taking the seven loaves, giving thanks, He broke and gave to His disciples to set before the people. And they had a few little fishes, and He blessed them, and commanded them to be set before them. And they did eat, and were filled; and they took up that which was left of the fragments, seven baskets: and they that had eaten were about four thousand: and He sent them away.
