MARIA ASSUMPTA

According to the hymn from the Ancient Armenian Breviary, the Assumption of Our Lady into Heaven is described thus:

Today the blessed Apostles and holy virgins gathered together and arrayed in glittering white garments, lit their lamps and sang, “Blessed art thou, yes, thrice blessed among women.”

Today while the Holy Virgin reposed in the sepulchre, they waited and hoped for the coming of the Lord, and they beheld the Creator come from on high amid the Angels and in accord with them they said: “Blessed art thou, yes, thrice blessed among women.”

Today they have beheld the most Holy Virgin borne aloft and ascending to Heaven upon a chariot of clouds, to enter there with the prudent virgins, and sing: “Blessed art thou, yes, thrice blessed among women.”...

Today the Angels bore the most pure body of the Mother of God from the lower to the higher sphere; therefore it is that the Church with jubilee chants her new hymns. 
This hymn draws upon the tradition of the Church in Jerusalem, which held that Mary the Blessed Mother died there, that she was buried in a tomb near the Garden of Gethsemane, and that on the third after her death, or her “dormition”, that is, her “falling asleep”, her tomb was found mysteriously empty, though undisturbed, and fragrant with flowers. The pilgrimages the faithful made to the place of Mary’s sepulchre are the origin of the feast of the Assumption in the city of Jerusalem.

The dogma of Mary’s Assumption, as solemnly defined by Pope Pius XII on November 1st, 1950, however, does not take a position on the time, place, or other circumstances of Mary’s Assumption. It limits itself to saying that Mary’s body was glorified and that it is necessarily connected to Mary’s other two preceding privileges: her Immaculate Conception and her Divine Maternity: *“The Immaculate Mother of God, at the close of her earthly career was taken up into Heaven, body and soul.”*

This is the mystery of faith we celebrate on the 15th of August, whose spirit we continue to rest in and ponder over these following days.

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY *(Luke 11:5-13)*

These verses following the Lord's Prayer offer several points for our meditation. In typical fashion, Jesus teaches by use of a parable. The scenario He presents seems unlikely in Western culture: a friend knocking on another friend's front door in the

middle of the night asking for provisions for an unexpected house guest. Who does that? This was not entirely uncommon in the ancient world.

To begin with, the sleep cycles of people in the ancient world were different from ours. They likely went to bed around 8:00 P.M., and woke up around 11:00 P.M. or midnight to conduct business or tend to some matter or other, and then go back to bed until around 5:00 or 6:00 A.M. In addition to this, hospitality was far more valued in the ancient world than it is now. It was not uncommon for people to go to great lengths to assist a complete stranger (so long as he did not appear to be an imminent threat). And it would not be impossible for such a stranger to be coming in from a journey extremely late at night, tired, and in need of food and lodging. One could hope to receive the same treatment were they in a similar predicament. For purposes of comparison, simply read the

instructions on hospitality in Hebrews 13:12. Similarly, many of us can remember the stress laid upon the virtue of hospitality in Homer's *Odyssey*.

Jesus' parable depicts the annoyance of the friend comfortably settled in bed finally mustering the effort to get up and help his friend (vv. 7-8). Surely, the friend in bed knew that he must help his friend to meet the demands of the virtue of hospitality. More than that, however, Jesus directs our attention to the fact that the man finally gets up to help, because his friend was persistent in his request (v. 8). Herein is the lesson for us. Jesus desires that we manifest unflagging persistence in our prayer.

The friend in bed (clearly annoyed at the inconvenience) is oftentimes how we think of God: annoyed and bothered at our requests, or only responding begrudgingly. This is a deception, for Jesus himself explicitly commends persistence. He *wants* to hear our prayers. We see Jesus' concern for the man's needs in St. John's account of the wedding in Cana (cf. Jn. 2:11). We must have the faith to believe that Christ truly cares for our needs, and most of all, for our souls' well-being (cf. 1 Pet. 5:7).

After giving this parable, Jesus offers a beautiful invitation to us to make requests: "Ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you" (v. 9). To these imperatives, He attaches the promise that we will receive, find, and have the door opened for us (v. 10). This, of course, does *not* mean that we have a blank check with God. So, what *will* God give us? The answer is in v. 13: the Holy Spirit! God is our first beginning and last end. Desiring and loving Him is the joy and substance of heaven. Jesus again uses parables in vv.11-13 to illustrate how much more generous He is in comparison to man: "*What father among you would hand his son a snake when he asks for a fish? Or hand him a scorpion when he asks for an egg? If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him?*"

God is not capricious. He is so very attentive to our good, and infinitely wiser than us in His provision thereof. This will be stunningly clear to us at our particular judgment.





TENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: Psalm 54: 17, 18, 20, 23 When I cried to the Lord He heard my voice, from them that draw near to me; and He humbled them, who is before all ages, and remains for ever: cast thy care upon the Lord, and He shall sustain thee. Psalm 54: 2 Hear, O God, my prayer, and despise not my supplication; be attentive to me and hear me. V. Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT O God, who dost manifest Thy almighty power chiefly in showing mercy and pity; increase Thy mercy towards us, that we, seeking the way of Thy promises, may be made partakers of Thy heavenly treasures. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: 1 Corinthians 12: 2-11 Brethren, you know that, when you were heathens, you went to dumb idols, according as you were led. Wherefore I give you to understand, that no man, speaking by the Spirit of God, saith Anathema to Jesus; and no man can say: The Lord Jesus, but by the Holy Ghost. Now there are diversities of graces, but the same Spirit; and there are diversities of ministries, but the same Lord; and there are diversities of operations, but the same God, who worketh all in all. And the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man unto profit. To one indeed, by the Spirit, is given the word of wisdom; and to another, the word of knowledge, according to the same Spirit; to another the grace of healing in one Spirit; to another, the working of miracles; to another, prophecy; to another, the discerning of spirits; to another, divers kinds of tongues; to another, interpretation of speeches. But all these things one and the same Spirit worketh, dividing to every one according as He will.

GOSPEL: Luke 18: 9-14 **At** that time, Jesus spoke this parable to some who trusted in themselves as just, and despised others. Two men went up into the temple to pray; the one a Pharisee, and the other a Publican. The Pharisee standing prayed thus with himself: O God, I give Thee thanks that I am not as the rest of men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers; as also is this publican. I fast twice in the week; I give tithes of all that I possess. And the Publican standing afar off would not so much as lift up his eyes towards heaven, but struck his breast saying: O God, be merciful to me a sinner. I say to you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other: because every one that exalteth himself shall be humbled, and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.

OFFERTORY: Psalm 24: 1-3 To Thee, O Lord, have I lifted up my soul: in Thee, O my God, I put my trust, let me not be ashamed: neither let my enemies laugh at me: for none of them that wait on Thee shall be confounded.
