



THE MONTH OF OCTOBER: “RESPECT LIFE” MONTH

Every year in our country of the United States this month of October is observed as “Respect Life” Month. This first Sunday in October is observed as “Respect Life” Sunday. These days of October, so wonderfully fragrant with the Mysteries of the prayer of the Holy Rosary, are an opportunity to underscore our Catholic belief in the sanctity of human life in the face of so much degradation of the same.

Our faith teaches us that each human soul is a special, unique creation of God. The value of human life is intrinsic and does not depend upon its usefulness or desirability from a materialist point of view. The Church has always taught that abortion at any stage was forbidden because it interfered with God’s work of bringing a human life into the world. Advances in scientific technology in recent decades have proven to us that a person is alive and complete in all that will be needed for his human development at the moment of conception, making it morally certain that God

creates the individual soul at that moment too.


The implications for facing real-life situations from this core belief about who and what the human person is are staggering, for they completely up-end any ordinary notions we might have of what a life—any life—is worth. Cardinal Sean, as the chairman of the U.S. Bishop’s Committee on Pro-Life Activities, has explained that this year’s Respect Life theme comes from a quotation of our Holy Father Pope Francis: *“Even the weakest and most vulnerable, the sick, the old, the unborn and the poor, are MASTERPIECES OF GOD’S CREATION, made in His own image, destined to live forever, and deserving of the utmost reverence and respect.”*

The Pro-Life Office for our Archdiocese of Boston in conjunction with the Secretariat for New Evangelization has made available to parishes a number of written materials pertinent to the “Life issues”. During the course of this month you will find at the entrance tables of the church and in the pamphlet rack a number of informational pamphlets and flyers. Among the titles are: *Children As Commodities?, Adoption, An Adoption Love Story, Healing Within Marriage from an Abortion, Advance Planning for Your Future, Poverty and Abortion, a Vicious Cycle, Adoption: A Loving Alternative to Abortion, Why You Should Have a Health Care Proxy, Palliative Care and the Catholic Faith, What You Should Know About Hospice Care, and Solace and Strength in the Sorrow of a Miscarriage.*

These materials are there for you to take either for yourselves or to pass along to others. Being “Pro-Life” as an expression of our Catholic Faith goes well beyond the “moral minimum” of recognizing that the direct taking of an innocent human life through abortion is a violation of the Fifth Commandment *“Thou shalt not kill.”*

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH



GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 12:35-40)

As Jesus continues to instruct His disciples in chapter 12, He transitions from teaching about almsgiving to the importance of vigilance: "Gird your loins and light your lamps and be like servants who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open

immediately when he comes and knocks" (vv. 35-36). In the Jewish culture of Jesus' day, wedding celebrations lasted *several days*, so the scenario that He presents of a master returning in the early hours of the morning is not far off (cf. v. 38). He could come any moment, so the servants had to be ready to receive him.

There is a beautiful hymn from the Morning Office of the Maronite Catholic Church which takes up Jesus' image in this passage (as well as a related passage in Mt. 25:1-13), exhorting us to prepare for His return with joy: "Our King comes in majestic glory. *Let us light our lamps and go forth to meet Him. Let us find our joy in Him, for He has found joy in us. He will indeed rejoice us with His marvelous light*" (italics added).

The lighting of lamps implies keeping vigil, and not falling asleep. We should be ready at a moment's notice, because His coming is *good news* for

those who are His friends.

If we are saying our prayers daily, then we are heeding the Lord's instructions, in part. In the Lord's Prayer, we pray "Thy Kingdom come," asking that Christ return and establish His definitive rule for all eternity. His kingdom of peace and justice cannot come too soon! In the Hail Mary, we ask Mary to pray for us "at the hour of our death." Thus, we implore her aid in that critical moment when we will need to choose to yield ourselves to God's embrace for all eternity. In the Apostles' Creed, we profess Jesus' Second Coming explicitly: "From thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead." We affirm the inescapability of final judgment, and this can inspire more caution in us when we feel the pressure of temptation. We do well to think on these things, not to lessen our joy in this life, but to prepare soberly and joyfully for the next.

In vv. 37-38, Jesus calls the vigilant servants "blessed" twice, and promises to have *them* sit down so that He may serve them (not the other way around)! Christ foreshadows this in His washing of the disciples' feet (cf. Jn. 13:1-20), and we have a foretaste of it when we receive Holy Communion. The image is particularly apparent when we kneel at the rail and the priest passes up and down the rail serving us. In the Book of Revelation, Jesus again employs the imagery of table fellowship, inviting us to repentance and union with Him: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with Me" (Rev. 3:20). The metaphor of table fellowship ultimately points to the Beatific Vision, where our Lord will wipe every tear from His servants' eyes, and grant them the joy of seeing Him face to face (cf. Rev. 21:3-4; 22:4).

Jesus reinforces the imminence of His coming with another parable: "...if the master of the house had known the hour when the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come" (vv. 39-40). Since Christ could come by the time you have finished reading this sentence, it is worth thinking about whether or not we are ready for Jesus to return. Let us use every day as an opportunity to be prepared more fully for this ultimate encounter with our Lord.

THE MOST HOLY ROSARY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

INTROIT: Let us all rejoice in the Lord, celebrating a festival-day in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary, for whose solemn festival the Angels rejoice and give praise to the Son of God. *Psalm 44:2* My heart hath uttered a good word: I speak my works to the King *V.* Glory be to the Father...

COLLECT: O God, whose only-begotten Son by His Life and death and resurrection has won for us the rewards of eternal salvation, grant, we pray, that we who meditate on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: *Proverbs 8: 22-24, 32-35* The Lord possessed me in the beginning of His ways, before He made anything, from the beginning. I was set up from eternity, and of old, before the earth was made. The depths were not as yet, and I was already conceived. Now therefore, ye children, hear me: blessed are they that keep my ways. Hear instruction, and be wise, and refuse it not. Blessed is the man that heareth me, and that watcheth daily at my gates; and waiteth at the posts of my doors. He that shall find me, shall find life, and shall have salvation from the Lord.

GOSPEL: *Luke 1:26-38* **At** that time, the Angel Gabriel was sent from God into a city of Galilee, called Nazareth, to a virgin espoused to a man whose name was Joseph, of the House of David: and the virgin's name was Mary. And the angel being come in, said unto her: Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women. Who, having heard, was troubled at his saying and thought with herself what manner of salutation this should be. And the angel said to her: Fear not, Mary, for thou hast found grace with God. Behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb and shalt bring forth a Son: and thou shalt call His name Jesus. He shall be great and shall be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of David His Father: and He shall reign in the House of Jacob forever, and of His Kingdom there shall be no end. And Mary said to the angel: How shall this be done since I know not man? And the angel answering, said to her: The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee and the power of the Most High shall overshadow thee. And therefore also the Holy which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God. And behold thy cousin Elizabeth, she also hath conceived a son in her old age: and this is the sixth month with her that is called barren; because no word shall be impossible with God. And Mary said: Behold the handmaid of the Lord, be it done to me according to thy word.

OFFERTORY: *Ecclus. 24: 25; 39:17* In me is all grace of the way and of the truth; in me is all hope of life and of virtue. Like a rose planted on the rivers I have budded forth.

SECRET Make us worthy, O Lord, we beseech Thee, to offer Thee this sacrifice; and by means of the mysteries of the most holy Rosary may we so keep in mind the life, passion and glory of Thine only-begotten Son, that we may be made worthy of His promises. Who with Thee liveth.
