

Pastor's Note

CONNECTING TO THE CHRIST-LIFE

Saint Peter the Apostle, in his First Epistle, exhorts his fellow believers to follow in the footsteps of Christ:

Dearly beloved, Christ suffered for us, leaving you an example that you should follow in His steps. 'Who did no sin, neither was guile found in His mouth.' (I Peter 2:21)

When he speaks of Christ's example and following in His steps he means much more than simply trying to imitate Christ's virtuous behavior. To ponder the meaning of his words is to open up consideration of how our life here on this earth is mystically incorporated into Christ's own Life by virtue of our Baptism.

As God Christ exists from all eternity, "*begotten not made, consubstantial with the Father*": as Man, however, Christ's Life has a beginning when He was conceived by the power of the Holy Ghost in the womb of Mary, His Virgin Mother. This Life on earth is spoken of as "The Mystery of the Thirty-three Years". On the fortieth day after Easter, when Christ ascended into Heaven in His glorified Body, the whole 33 years of Christ's visible Life on earth was subsumed into His glorified Life. The relationship then of the whole Christ-life to our world of time and space breaks the bonds that normally govern it.

We see this, for example, in the sufferings of Christ. The actual sufferings Jesus Christ endured during the course of His 33 years were not confined by a human experience in that time-frame. On the Cross, all of the sins of mankind—both those that had been committed up until that time and those to come until the end of time (our sins!) pressed upon Him. His Sacred Human Heart suffered all of its immensity. In a similar way, the consolations and the joys Christ felt during His 33 years

were not limited just to the human love He received from His Mother Mary, St. Joseph, the faithful Apostles, His friends like Lazarus, Martha and Mary Magdalene. All of the love and adoration and affection for Jesus expressed by faithful souls also consoled and rejoiced His Sacred Heart. Although the sins of men tormented Him on the Cross, the gratitude and the sanctity of human souls for all time, from the innocence of baptized infants to the courage of the martyrs shedding their blood in union with His, also touched Him.

An awareness of this mystery help us to appreciate the Mass as not only Calvary, but as a re-presentation of the *whole* Christ-Life, from His conception at Nazareth to His Ascension on the Mount of Olives.

It also indicates to us that we should look to interpret and understand the experiences of our lives here on earth in terms of their relation to the Christ-Life. The immediate, unreflected "stuff" of our lives is just like so much meta-data collected by a computer. It doesn't seem to mean anything. This is the sense in which Blaise Pascal, a most fervent Catholic believer, wrote in his *Pensee*: "*The eternal silence of this infinite space frightens me.*"

If we seek, however, to relate and interpret the personal happenings of our lives to Christ (and in a wide sense to include the relation that various people in the Gospels have to Christ) then it can really be stunning to us how much clarity we get. We see our lives, as we are living them, patterned by joy, light, sorrow, and hints of the glory to come as in the Mysteries of the Rosary, in a complexity we can perceive though not comprehend. It is a complexity beautifully expressed by St. Paul: "*For you have died and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ who is our life appears, then you will also appear with Him in glory.*" (Col. 3:3)

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 18:18-30 (PART 2)

In response to a rich official's inquiry regarding the road to eternal life in St. Luke chapter 18, Jesus points out to him the universal path (the Commandments), as well as giving him an individually tailored prescription (divestment of riches). Everyone is bound to observe the former, but, as many commentaries indicate, not everyone is bound to observe the latter, like the rich man was called to do, since his wealth was his particular idol. Unable to heed Jesus' call, the man becomes "quite sad," because he is "very rich" (v. 23).

After this exchange, Jesus teaches the disciples about riches and renunciation in vv. 24-30.

Jesus responds to the rich man's sadness in vv. 24-25: "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God! For it is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." To those listening, it seemed as if Jesus was saying that it was impossible for *anyone* to enter heaven. In their minds, as one commentator notes, the wealthy and prosperous were obviously favored by God. If then, the rich could hardly hope to enter heaven, how could the lower classes, let alone the poor? Hence, their exclamation: "Then who can be saved?" (v. 26). Jesus corrects their misinterpretation: "What is impossible for human beings is possible for God" (v. 27). In other words, God's grace can overcome any seemingly insurmountable obstacle, provided man yields to this grace.

St. Peter then joins the conversation, saying to Christ, "We have given up our possessions and followed you" (v. 28). St. Peter reminds Jesus that he and the eleven did what the rich man could not. In St. Matthew's account of this passage, St. Peter then asks Jesus, "What will there be for us?" (Cf. Mt. 19:27).

This can question be inferred in St. Luke's account. Jesus responds to St. Peter with the following words in vv. 29-30: "Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or wife or brothers or parents or children for the sake of the kingdom of God who will not receive back an overabundant return in this present age and eternal life in the age to come." Jesus confirms for his apostles that they are on the road to heaven, assuring them of their reward.

At this point, it is important to note that, unlike us, the twelve apostles were uniquely engaged in itinerant ministry, and so, when Jesus called them, they had to choose between their secular trades, or following Christ (Cf. Luke 5:10-11, 27-28). Their choice can be likened to the evangelical counsel of poverty, embraced by religious (Cf. Catechism nos. 915-916). Christ proposes it to all, but it is not a commandment. To those called to embrace this life of sacrifice, Christ promises special blessings now and hereafter. God is never outdone in generosity!

To follow Christ as a devoted disciple, however, does not necessarily demand sacrificing personal wealth. Christ issues a very particular call to the rich man to embrace the evangelical counsel of poverty, but he does not require everyone to do this. For example, St. Zacchaeus willingly made generous restitution for his former financial corruption, but was not asked to abandon his wealth entirely to become a believer (cf. 19:8-10). As Catholics, it is critical to interpret Jesus' instructions properly. The Church's Tradition always balances the evangelical counsel of poverty, on the one hand, and her social teachings on private property and the common good, on the other (Cf. Catechism nos. 2402-2404).


