





Pastor's Note

IN THE TIME OF EBOLA PLAGUE

This past summer we were blessed to have the assistance of Fr. Desire Salako of the SMA Fathers (Society of the African Missions). Fr. Salako is Pastor of the parish of St. Mary of the Immaculate Conception in Sennequellie, County Nimba, Liberia. It lies smack in the middle of the region ravaged by the deadly Ebola plague last year. Here in this country we had the news reports of the disaster that was unfolding in West Africa, and of the isolated outbreaks of the disease in this country brought in by people returning from there (the Liberian man in Texas and the two nurses who got it from treating him). Fr. Salako, however, found himself there on the front lines, and over the weeks he was here with us in the rectory this summer he eventually opened up and shared with us a great many details about his experiences which I want to summarize in this Pastor's Note.

When the Ebola appeared in Liberia in the spring of 2014, and it was clear that there was no way of controlling its spread, Fr. Salako's SMA superiors tried to recall him from his post in order to spare his life. Facing the risk of mortality right in front of him, Fr. Salako informed them that he wished to stay. How, he told them, could he ever be a priest to them again if he appeared to flee when they were sick and dying? *"So what do I say to them then? 'God loves you'?"*

Fr. Salako mentioned in his Mission Appeal that over a decade of civil war in Liberia prior to the Ebola outbreak had left the country without any health-care system in place. The situation was basically "every man for himself", *saue qu'il peut!* Mass panic set in. People fled from the towns into the bush, imagining that the disease was in the towns. This had the double-effect of spreading the disease more quickly through the countryside and also making it

harder to find sick people and treat them.

Those whose duty it was to try to alleviate the situation, such as Catholic priests and religious, were left to do what they could do with very little means. Fr. Salako described looking for Ebola victims left on the roads or at the periphery of villages, abandoned out of fear, and trying to rescue them with their parish truck. The authorities' response to reports of Ebola in a neighborhood or village was to declare its inhabitants quarantined. Fr. Salako would be among those, who—on their own, brought food and supplies to these quarantined people. They took precautions but, in that situation, they were at constant risk of infection. Fr. Salako did not get Ebola. He was spared. Others were not, and a great many of them died. They are hidden martyrs of charity.

In the aftermath of the Ebola outbreak, there was much added suffering. Liberia as a country was internationally quarantined. Normal commerce stopped. Roughly 5,000 people died of Ebola in Liberia. Much greater, however, are the mortality estimates for other diseases and conditions which could not be treated for lack of access to medications on account of this international quarantine. Also, farmers could not sow their fields because Ebola struck at seed-time. At harvest-time last year there was very little to harvest. Hunger—acute hunger—overshadows the land. Fr. Salako has taken responsibility for 55 children in his parish whose parents died from Ebola. Whatever share of the Mission Appeal collection he is allowed to keep from the SMA Fathers for his own parish he can put to immediate use for them.

In my meetings with our Parish Pastoral Council and Parish Finance Council this fall I intend to discuss with them how we might continue as a parish to be of help to Fr. Salako in the work he is doing in Liberia.

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 22: 47-53

The pace of St. Luke's Passion narrative increases dramatically with the betrayal in Gethsemane in v. 47: *"While He was still speaking, a crowd approached and in front was one of the Twelve, a man named Judas."* What was Jesus in the middle of saying? In v. 46, Jesus was urging the fatigued disciples, *"Get up*

and pray that you may not undergo the test." The test was now fully underway.

Judas approaches Jesus to kiss him (v. 47), the signal by which he was to identify him for the soldiers (cf. Mt. 26:48). The irony is maddening, for a kiss on the cheek was a normal sign of friendship, as is still customary in many cultures today. Jesus' words to Judas in v. 48 before he actually kisses Him are striking in their bluntness: *"Judas, are you betraying the Son of Man with a kiss?"* It is as if He is saying, *"Are you really about to do this horrible thing...to Me, your Lord and Master? Do you realize how imperiled your soul is?"* Jesus confronts Judas with the ugliness of his sin before he does the deed, as if to shake him out of his bondage to the devil.

As we contemplate this scene, Jesus speaks not only to the supreme sin of Judas, but also to our own sins, which are betrayals of His love. Jesus likewise demonstrates here how to apply fraternal correction. Our Lord's focus is not on revenge, resentment, or expressions of hatred for the betrayed trust. While certainly grieved by sin, He is not pre-occupied with His wound, but rather with the soul of the sinner. Jesus' piercing words identify the horror of Judas' sin, in order to elicit shame and detestation for the sin, thereby opening the door for true contrition. We can imagine Jesus' words running over and over again in Judas' mind as he is filled with regret later on (cf. Mt. 27:3), just as St.

Peter remembers Jesus' words and is cut to the heart (vv. 61-62). Unlike St. Peter, however, Judas fails to move beyond his shame to embrace Jesus' mercy.

After Judas betrays Our Lord, the disciples spring into action with violent defense, which Jesus immediately halts, healing a man whose right ear is cut off in the scuffle (vv. 49-51). The detail about the man's *right* ear suggests St. Luke's characteristic careful investigation into the matter, as with all aspects of his Gospel (cf. 1:2-3). We see Jesus exercising compassion for another, even as He is in the midst of the worst kind of betrayal. As the commentary in the Orthodox Study Bible aptly observes, Jesus' healing of this man illustrates His teaching on love for enemies. Oftentimes when we are upset or wounded, we can fail to take others' needs into account, and even lash out at them. In this area of our lives, may Our Lord give us the grace to be partakers of His own serenity, and to exercise compassion during times of turmoil and stress.


The betrayal in Gethsemane ends with Jesus' dramatic words to the soldiers in vv. 52-53: *"Have you come out as against a robber, with swords and clubs? Day after day I was with you in the temple area, and you did not seize me; but this is your hour, the time for the power of darkness."* Jesus exposes the grievous injustice against Him in this highly secretive and heavily-armed snatch and grab. Jesus likewise signals the beginning of the fulfillment of the Isaian prophecy he mentioned at the Last Supper: *"this scripture must be fulfilled in Me, namely, 'He was counted among the wicked.'" (cf. v. 37).* Jesus' crucifixion between two robbers reinforces this prophecy vividly. In this vein, St. Paul says that *"[God] made him [Christ] to be sin who did not know sin, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him"* (cf. 2 Cor. 5:21).


