Today we welcome our former parishioner Jon Tveit back to Mary Immaculate of Lourdes as *Father Jon Tveit*, a newly ordained priest of Jesus Christ, incardinated in the Archdiocese of New York. We are very grateful to Fr. Tveit for making the journey back to Boston this Sunday so that we may experience the joy of having him as our priest at Mass. In a few days, Fr. Tveit will take up his new pastoral assignment as parochial vicar at the Church of the Resurrection in Rye, New York.

This is now the Second Mass of Thanksgiving for a newly ordained priest we have had at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes in the last two weeks. Two weeks from today we will have a third, when Fr. Juan Carlos Rivera, S.J., returns to Boston after his Ordination in St. Louis, Missouri and his First Mass of Thanksgiving in his childhood parish in Puerto Rico.

To state the obvious: it is most unusual for any parish to celebrate the ordinations of three priests connected to it, one after another, within one month's time, but that is what we are doing. Let us take note of it! This is a time of "the favor of the Lord": a beautiful occurrence within this Extraordinary Jubilee "Year of Mercy": a moment of great grace.

Every religious vocation which comes to fruition is a masterpiece of God's special Providence. So many things independent of one another have to align (the discernment of the aspirant, the judgment of the various formation directors, the successful completion of the lengthy time of probation and the subjective experience of it): so many obstacles to overcome. I mention two in particular.

First, the deep-seated hostility to Catholic priests which exists in society, justified in part by the scandals given by errant priests, but not caused by it. The French Catholic novelist Georges Bernanos touched upon it when he wrote: *"The hatred of priests is one of the most mysterious things in the world."*

Second, there is the heaviness of human weakness. If a priestly formation program has done its job, when the man who is a candidate for the priesthood writes the letter to his bishop or superior requesting Holy Orders he has already acquired at least some healthy "knowledge of acquaintance" of what human weakness is—his own and others, and of what people's struggles are and where Jesus is in them. For him, the words of St. Paul in II Corinthians Chapter 12 now have a personal resonance: *"[The Lord] said to me: My grace is sufficient for thee, for strength is made perfect in weakness."* (II Cor. 12:9)

True priestly vocations are the Lord's work, first and foremost. We co-operate with His grace but there is no "winning formula" to make them happen. Let us give thanks today for these three new priests in particular whom God has give to His Church.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST Romans 8:18-23

St. Paul's words in today's Epistle regarding the "redemption of our bodies" (v. 23, RSV), recall the central theme of Eastertide, namely, the resurrection. Green Sundays during the Church year (Sundays after Epiphany and Pentecost) afford us the opportunity periodically to reflect on one or more themes which were emphasized more acutely during the festal periods. Today's Epistle draws out some of the implications of our Christian hope in the resurrection of the body. This is a promise consequent upon Jesus' own bodily resurrection and our share therein through the sacraments. Indeed, bodily resurrection is the key to understanding the whole passage.

In the verses prior to v. 23, St. Paul underlines the reality of the transitory nature of this world. Four times he emphasizes this: "the creation waits" (v. 19), "the creation was subjected to futility" (v. 20), "the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay" (v. 21), "the whole creation has been groaning" (v. 22- all references RSV). Whatever joys and blessings we have in this life, death and suffering remind us that this is a very imperfect world compared to the world of heaven.

St. Paul answers the four-fold description of creation's present sorrow with a forceful and four-fold response: suffering creation awaits "the revealing of the sons of God" (v. 19), it waits "in hope" (v. 20), it awaits "the glorious liberty of the children of God" (v. 21), it awaits our "adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies" (v. 23- all references RSV). It would appear that the resurrection of the body is the fulcrum around which the transformation of all creation from death to life turns. Christ has begun this transformation Himself, having risen from the dead, and we profess that He will give his faithful people a share in His resurrection at the Final Judgment (cf. 1 Cor. 15:20-28, 42-57). It is a gift issuing from our identity as His sons, an identity infused at baptism.

In our meditation on life after the grave, we rightly long for and speak of heaven as a world

beyond our present experience of this material life. The Beatific Vision, that is, the vision of God Himself enjoyed by the faithful, far exceeds our highest and most beautiful imaginings. This is partly what St. Paul means when he says "that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us" (v. 18, RSV). We must never forget, however, that part of God's ultimate plan for the life of heaven is the redemption and recreation of this present fallen world. The creation that God deemed to be good prior to Adam's sin, is not doomed to oblivion, but will be "transformed" (cf. Catechism nos. 1046-1047). This is the "new heaven" and the "new earth" we read of in St. John's Book of Revelation (cf. Rev. 21:1).

Once again, the heart of this doctrine is the glorified flesh of Jesus Himself. We are not Gnostic heretics who despise matter and wish to dissolve forever into a ghost world after death. We are Catholic Christians, who affirm the goodness and beauty of material creation, as well as the hope of its renewal. These truths are most clearly revealed to us by faith in the glorified bodies of the Risen Christ, and his Blessed Mother assumed into heaven. In every Mass, we both worship and receive the glorified Flesh of Christ, Who Himself becomes our "pledge of future glory," in the words of the hymn *O Sacrum Convivium* (cf. Catechism nos. 1000, 1323).

And He saw two ships standing by the lake; but the fishermen were gone out of them, and were washing their nets; and going up into one of the ships that was Simon's, He desired him to draw back a little from the land: and sitting He taught the multitudes out of the ship. Now when He had ceased to speak, He said to Simon: Launch out into the deep, and let down your nets for a draught. And Simon, answering, said to Him: Master, we have laboured all the night, and have taken nothing, but at Thy word I will let down the net. And when they had done this, they enclosed a very great multitude of fishes; and their net broke: and they beckoned to their partners that were in the other ship, that they should come and help them; and they came, and filled both the ships, so that they were almost sinking. Which when Simon Peter saw, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying: Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord. For he was wholly astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of fishes which they had taken: and so were also James and John the sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. 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
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St Mary's Cemetery in Needham, founded in the 1870's, is the parish cemetery of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes. The Cemetery is a reverent resting place for those awaiting reunion with the Risen Lord. The decision to pre-plan and purchase interment rights is a responsible and thoughtful gesture, sparing loved ones the stress of making difficult decisions during a time of grief and loss.
