Pastor's Note

THE PRIMARY MORAL DUTY OF KEEPING ONESELF ALIVE

Whether a person considers himself religious or not, every one realizes at some point or other that he has moral duties in life which—like it or not—he has an obligation to fulfill. One of these moral duties is the duty to preserve one's own life.

As Catholics we perceive this duty as part of our relationship to God as the Creator and the Giver of Life. Our very life itself is a gift of God. We are but stewards of this life: we are not the owners.

The life of charity includes the charity that we owe to ourselves (*caritas sui* in Latin, “charity-to-oneself”). We owe it to ourselves to keep ourselves alive by proper care of our body's needs and not to foolishly put that life at risk. (For example, thrill-seekers who participate in extreme sports where there is a high risk of serious injury or death are violating this primary moral duty to keep oneself alive.) If we fall seriously ill, we are morally bound to seek remedy by the ordinary means at hand.

We are strictly forbidden to take our own lives by suicide. In a culture such as ours where there is a wide permission given for suicide as an expression of the autonomy of self it is very important for us as Catholics to be reminded that suicide is a grave sin against the Fifth Commandment *Thou shalt not kill*. It is self-murder.

In the Glossary of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* we find this definition of suicide:

SUICIDE: *The willful taking of one's own life, a grievous sin against the Fifth Commandment. A human person is neither the author nor the supreme arbiter of his life, of which God is the Sovereign Master.*

In the body of the *Catechism* we find the

teaching against suicide spelled out.

Everyone is responsible for his life before God who has given it to him. It is God who remains the Sovereign Master of Life. We are obliged to accept life gratefully and preserve it for His honor and the salvation of our souls. We are stewards, not owners, of the life God has entrusted to us. It is not ours to dispose of. (PAR 2280)

Suicide contradicts the natural inclination of the human being to preserve and perpetuate his life. It is gravely contrary to the just love of self. It likewise offends love of neighbor because it unjustly breaks the ties of solidarity with family, nation and other human societies to which we continue to have obligations. Suicide is contrary to love for the Living God. (PAR 2281)

This does not mean, however, that subjective states of mind cannot mitigate the guilt of suicide in particular cases. As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* also clarifies:

Grave psychological disturbances, anguish, or grave fear of hardship, suffering, or torture can diminish the responsibility of the one committing suicide. (PAR 2282)

We should not despair of the eternal salvation of persons who have taken their own lives. By ways known to Him alone, God can provide the opportunity for salutary repentance. The Church prays for persons who have taken their own lives. (PAR 2283)

If in times past the Church refused public funeral rites for suicides and forbade their burial in consecrated ground it was in large part an effort at deterrence for others. This is no longer the case. Now we emphasize the riches of Divine Mercy and there are even prayers in the revised funeral rites specific to those who have died by suicide.

Nonetheless, we need to be crystal clear in our own minds of the wrongness of suicide.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST PHILIPPIANS 1:6-11

In today's Epistle, St. Paul addresses the Church in Philippi, a Macedonian city near the Northern coastline of the Aegean Sea. This Church began as quite a small group- just a few Jewish women gathering *outdoors* for worship by a river bank (there was not even a local synagogue). Paul, Silas, Timothy, and Luke (the narrator and author of Acts) seek out the group and preach to them. As a result of the apostolic preaching, Lydia and her family are baptized, embracing the faith wholeheartedly and joyfully (cf. Acts 16:11-15).

This gives us a clear background for understanding St. Paul's affectionate words to them in the verses we hear today, as well as in 1:3-5, which precede today's verses: *"I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, thankful for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now"* (RSV). Thanks to the Book of Acts, we know about that successful "first day" of St. Paul's apostolate there. In contrast to some of St. Paul's missionary destinations, where he encountered outright persecution, the Christians in Philippi were docile to the doctrine of the faith, faithful in trials, and joyful in discipleship (cf. vv. 7, 9, 4:4-5).

When we read the Pauline epistles, we always need to keep the original context in mind, so as to arrive at a sound interpretation of the literal (i.e., the original) sense. But we must also recognize that St. Paul's letters convey counsels that are relevant for any believer or any local Church in any age (the spiritual senses of the text are always built upon the literal, cf. *Catechism* nos. 115-117). Thus, St. Paul speaks directly to us and our own contemporary pastoral needs. In view of this, then, today's excerpt from the introduction of Philippians can encourage us both to trust in God's providence and mercy, and to refocus our efforts in this life toward the eternal reward of heaven.

In the monastic *Rule* of St. Benedict, the great

father of Western monasticism instructs his monks "never [to] lose hope in God's mercy" (cf. Benedict, *Rule*, 4:74). For some of us, the temptation we face is not laxity, but scrupuosity. This misplaced, hyper-obsession with sin and the fear of sin and punishment is *not* God's will for us. Rather, we need to hold onto St. Paul's declaration to his flock in Philippi: *"And I am sure that He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ"* (v. 6, RSV). St. Paul would have his spiritual children grow in the graces of their baptism (the good work God has begun in us), and so, to be ready to face both their particular judgment and the Last Judgment (*"the day of Jesus Christ"*) with confidence in God's grace. This is the basis for his prayer of vv. 9-11: *"that your love may abound more and more...[that you] may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruits of righteousness which come through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God"* (RSV).

God does not dispense the sacraments so that His children would *fail* to achieve eternal life, but so that they may attain it! We cannot attain heaven without supernatural grace which comes to us in the sacraments, particularly in baptism, penance, and the Eucharist. And if we sincerely seek to cooperate with these graces (abounding in charity and *"the fruits of righteousness"*), God will graciously convey us to the halls of heaven. Cooperating with the grace of the sacraments means that we as individuals and as a parish must strive to look more and more like the believers in Philippi: docile to the doctrine of the faith, faithful to Christ in suffering, and above all, joyful.




