


Parish Mission Statement



THE TRUE “SEAMLESS GARMENT”

Recently one of our parishioners Anthony Jay put a book into my hands: *2000 Years of Social Wisdom: Catholic Social Teaching from the Papacy*. This new book has been compiled by his brother Christopher

Jay, an alumnus of Wyoming Catholic College and Ave Maria School of Law. I was so impressed by this book that I am making it the subject of this week’s Pastor’s Note.

What is this book? *“This work is a collection of papal quotes on a spectrum of issues, with minimal commentary; for the most part it is not my personal take on Catholic Social Teaching but rather a collection of direct quotes from papal encyclicals. As such, I do not consider myself to have ‘authored’, but rather, to have ‘composed’.” (Prelude)*

What is its purpose? *“This book is meant first and foremost as a discovery of what the Catholic Church has actually taught for the past 2000 years in regards to ‘social teaching’ as laid out by teachings from the past 150 years (i.e. addressed to the modern world). As the Catholic Church is not exclusively anchored in any particular time or place, so too the teaching is not allegiant to any political party or country. I have also constructed this work to be as simple as possible: these few pages cannot delineate all of Catholic Social teaching, rather it is intended to build a foundation. There is much more to find in these teaching than I have laid out here; this is a curated selection based on topics that I have found either critical or confusing to many, especially since most topics are polarized (i.e. public vs. private, capitalism vs. socialism, etc.) with the*

Church taking either the difficult middle ground or a totally different stance than any given popular polarized ideology.” (Prelude)

Relying most heavily on curated quotations from Papal Encyclicals and organized by topics this book is an excellent resource as a *vademecum* (i.e., a “companion”) of Catholic Social Teaching. This is a ready access to the true “seamless garment” of Catholic Social Teaching on the sacred dignity of human life.

Christopher Jay writes: *Isaiah 55:8: “For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, declares the LORD.” I must again stress that there may be many teachings which surprise even educated and practicing Catholics, especially American Catholics. Always there is continuity in regards to official teachings throughout the years. That being said, I humbly ask the reader to approach the papal teachings in the spirit of Isaiah, remembering that God’s ways are not our ways, possibly even the ways we have come to think of as comfortable, conservative and traditional. As Pope Paul VI points out in Humane Vitae, the Pope, as representing the Church, is not the arbiter or author of Truth, only the caretaker and interpreter. This is, I believe, another sign that the Church’s teachings are of God, namely that, like the prophet Jeremiah, they make us all uncomfortable with our complacencies, while offerings us the way that is better than what we had thought.” (Prelude)*

It is an important task for anyone who would be a well-formed Catholic Christian to become ever more conversant in the sweep of the Catholic Church’s Social Teaching in regard to the issues of the day. I suggest that such a reading project would be a good project for this Lent 2017. Christopher Jay has made this book available without charge as an e-book on the website: www.whywesingatmass.org

SCRIPTURE STUDY

THE COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL: OUR LADY OF LOURDES, FEBRUARY 12th, A.D. 2017

For this week's meditation on the Collects of the Roman Missal, we consider the Collect for our parish's Patronal Feast, the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes (MR 1962). Below is the unofficial translation provided in the Angelus Press edition of the *Roman Catholic Daily Missal*:

"O God, Who by the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin didst prepare a worthy dwelling for Thy Son: we humbly beseech Thee, that we, who celebrate the Apparition of this same Blessed Virgin, may obtain health of soul and body. Through our Lord, etc. Amen."

Broken down into its five-part structure, the Collect looks like this:

1. O God (address),
2. Who prepared a worthy dwelling for Jesus via Mary's Immaculate Conception (acclamation),
3. grant us health of soul and body (petition),
4. we, who celebrate the apparition of Mary at Lourdes (motive for the petition),
5. Through Our Lord (concluding doxological formula).

Re-fashioned into a syllogism, we may interpret the Collect like this:

- A) If God prepared a worthy dwelling for Christ via Mary's Immaculate Conception,
B) And if we celebrate with faith the Apparition at Lourdes, an event which highlights God's miraculous grace at work in Mary's soul and body,
C) Then we may hope to receive spiritual and bodily healing from God through Christ.

The Feast of Mary's Apparitions at Lourdes in 1858 celebrates the miracle of her Immaculate Conception, infallibly promulgated by Blessed Pope Pius IX in 1854. Interestingly, when Our Lady revealed herself to St. Bernadette, she did not say, "I was immaculately conceived," but rather, "I *am* the Immaculate Conception," thus strongly identifying

her very being with the grace and love of God, her Creator and Redeemer. Mary's entire identity is rooted in God's miraculous grace in her life, from the moment of her Conception.

On the basis of God's grace at work in Mary, so the Collect argues, we hope to receive healing graces for the wounds and sicknesses of soul and body, all of which stem from Original Sin. Mary's deliverance from Original Sin stands as a powerful counter-sign to the effects of sin which we experience every day. We may confidently hope to experience God's healing grace, especially in the Sacraments, to counteract the destructive power of sin in our lives. We may even hope to experience relief from bodily sickness, if it be God's will. This is part of the on-going grace of Lourdes, as is well-known and well-attested.

We need not despair or lose faith, however, if we do not experience bodily healing in this life. The word order in the Collect is intentional: spiritual healing is always a priority over bodily healing, because the soul is immortal, while the flesh is not. We must also remember that *true and lasting* bodily healing comes with the Resurrection of the Body, as we profess in the Apostles' Creed. This is also part of the message of Lourdes, because the miracle of Mary's Immaculate Conception points towards her Assumption. Her experience of bodily resurrection three days after her Dormition is a consequence of the Immaculate Conception (*Catechism* no. 966). Thus, even if we do not experience healing from illness in this life, the grace of Lourdes necessarily directs us to the hope of bodily resurrection.

LATIN MASS PROPERS: SEPTUAGESIMA SUNDAY

INTROIT: Ps. 17. 5, 6, 7 The sorrows of death surrounded me, the of hell encompassed me: and in my affliction I called upon the Lord, and He heard my voice from His holy Temple *Psalm 17. 2-3* I will love Thee, O Lord, my strength: the Lord is my firmament, my refuge, and my deliverer. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Graciously hear, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the prayers of Thy people, that we who are justly afflicted for our sins, may be mercifully delivered by Thy goodness for the glory of Thy name. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: I Corinthians 9. 24-27; 10. 1-5 Brethren: Know you not that they that run in the race, all run indeed, but one receiveth the prize? So run that you may obtain. And every one that striveth for the mastery refraineth himself from all things: and they indeed that they may receive a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible one. I therefore so run, not as at an uncertainty; I so fight, not as one beating the air: but I chastise my body, and bring it into subjection, lest perhaps when I have preached to others, I myself should become a castaway. For I would not have you ignorant, brethren, that our fathers were all under the cloud, and all in Moses were baptized, in the cloud and in the sea: and all did eat the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink: (and they drank of the spiritual rock that followed them: and the rock was Christ). But with most of them God was not well pleased.

GRADUAL: Psalm 9. 10-11, 19-20 A helper in due time in tribulation: let them trust in Thee who know Thee: for Thou hast not forsaken them that seek Thee, O Lord. *V.* For the poor man shall not be forgotten to the end: the patience of the poor shall not perish forever: arise, O Lord, let no man prevail. **TRACT:** Psalm 129. 1-4 Out of the depths I have cried to Thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice *V.* Let Thine ears be attentive to the prayer of Thy servant. *V.* If Thou, O Lord, wilt mark iniquities: O Lord: O Lord, who shall abide it? *V.* For with Thee there is merciful forgiveness, and by reason of Thy law I have waited for Thee, O Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 20. 1-16 At that time Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: The kingdom of heaven is like to a householder who went out early in the morning to hire labourers into His vineyard. And having agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour, he saw others standing in the market place idle, and he said to them: Go you also into my vineyard, and I will give you what shall be just. And they went their way. And again he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour: and did in like manner. But about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing, and he saith to them: Why stand you here all the day idle? They say to him: Because no man hath hired us. He saith to them: Go you also into my vineyard. And when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard saith to his steward: Call the labourers and pay them their hire, beginning from the last even to the first. When therefore they were come that came about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first also came, they thought that they should receive more: and they also received every man a penny. And receiving it they murmured against the master of the house, saying: These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them equal to us that have borne the burden of the day and the heats. But he answering said to one of them: Friend, I do thee no wrong: didst thou not agree with me for a penny? Take what it is thine and go thy way: I will also give to this last even as to thee. Or is it not lawful for me to do what I will? Is thy eye evil, because I am good? So shall the last be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen.
