
ABOUT OUR PARISH



Pastor's Note



DUTY WILL MEET THE NEED
(Further Considerations on Parish Stewardship)

Last week's edition of the *Boston Pilot* listed all of the parishes of the Archdiocese of Boston and their place in the "Road Map" for the re-configuration plan *Disciples in Mission*. The place of our parish in the Plan, to re-iterate once again, is as a "stand-alone" parish. In Phase 11 for 2023 it is listed as such. Corpus Christi/St.



Bernard Parish and the Korean National Parish in the former parish church of Corpus Christi are also "stand-alone" parishes. There is no contingency regarding the Plan: the contingency is all on us. **If we are able to support our parish of Mary**

Immaculate of Lourdes through the "donor dollars" then we shall able to continue. If not, well...there are a lot of beautiful things in today's Church which have been lost that didn't need to be. Mary Immaculate of Lourdes would just be one more of them.

I thought we had a very good joint meeting of the Parish Finance Council and the Parish Pastoral Council on June 21st regarding the challenges of parish stewardship in general and in particular.

On the one hand, there is the need to finance a parish operating budget that has very high fixed costs. To give just two examples: 1) Each month the parish account with the Archdiocese of Boston is deducted by \$11,000+. This invoice is for the property insurances, payroll taxes, and

employee benefits. We have no control over these costs. Compare our Weekly Sunday Offertory amounts against just this one Monthly Invoice of \$11,000+. 2) The invoice for the professional servicing of the church's HVAC system to switch over from heat to air-conditioning was \$1,300+. These are the kinds of bills we are facing all the time in order just to keep the property maintained.

The "donor-dollars" we need to receive each year as the free-will gifts of the lay faithful just to cover our operating costs are in the range of \$730,000. Basically, this means a doubling of our offertory revenue for this new Fiscal Year 2018.

This is a very do-able task, especially when we look at the internal numbers for our parish giving. It was the consensus of the Parish Council Members that I should share this information with the whole parish:

Income has increased from last year YTD by approximately 5.6%

- 1. 9% of total parish households account for 46.2% of Total Giving.*
- 2. 60% of total households give less than \$20 per week (\$1,040 for 12 months)*
- 3. 45% of total households give less than \$10 per week (\$520 for 12 months)*

With the support of the Parish Councils I am planning to launch a parish pledge campaign for this fall. Being a practicing Catholic and becoming a member of a parish is obviously a voluntary undertaking. But once a person recognizes the value of both, he must also recognize the duty that falls upon his shoulders of giving a regular and generous church-support, proportionate to his means. I am convinced that if enough of our parishioners recognize this duty, then the doing of duty will meet the needs and more of our parish.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

THE COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL: JULY 9th, A.D. 2017 SAINT BENEDICT

For this week's meditation on the Collects of the Roman Missal, we consider the Collect for the Feast of St. Benedict (MR '70, July 11). Below is the official ICEL translation of this Collect in the third typical edition of the *Roman Missal* (2010):

"O God, who made the Abbot Saint Benedict an outstanding master in the school of divine service, grant, we pray, that, putting nothing before love of you, we may hasten with a loving heart in the way of your commands. Through our Lord, etc."

Broken down into its five-part structure, the Collect looks like this:

1. O God,
2. who made the Abbot Saint Benedict an outstanding master in the school of divine service (ascription),
3. grant, we pray, that we may hasten in the way of Your commands (petition),
- 4a. putting nothing before love of You (motive for the petition),
- 4b. with a loving heart (motive for the petition),
- Through our Lord, etc. (concluding doxological formula).

Re-fashioned into a syllogism, we may interpret the Collect like this:

- A) If we put nothing before the love of God (seeing as we can only have one Master),
- B) And if we enroll in the kind of humble servitude taught by St. Benedict in his *Rule*,
- C) Then we will be free to run in the way of God's commands, because he will have opened our hearts wide through the practice of spiritual discipline

Today's Collect references the Prologue of St. Benedict's *Rule* nos. 42-45, and 49. Below is the pertinent excerpt from the 1982 Liturgical Press translation of this 6th century Latin work:

"If we wish to reach eternal life...we must run and do now what will profit us forever. Therefore, we intend to establish a school for the Lord's service.....as we progress in this way of

life and in faith, we shall run on the path of God's commandments, our hearts overflowing with the inexpressible delight of love."

Our Collect presents us with a seeming paradox: servitude and freedom. On the one hand, the prayer commends a disciplined "servitude" to God (*divini servitii*, in the words of the Collect, referencing Benedict). On the other hand, the Collect's petition envisions an invigorating freedom, namely, that we may "run" in the way/path of the commandments (*curramus*, again referencing Benedict). How does freedom (symbolized by the metaphor of running) relate to servitude to Another (i.e., God)?

The two motives for the petition offer the solution. The first recognizes that this "running" in the path of God's commandments depends upon "putting nothing before love of [God]." Love is necessarily a free act. Thus, servitude to God is, in the first place, authentic love for Him in view of the goal of eternal life, as we can see in the excerpt from the *Rule* above. In the Gospel, Jesus says bluntly, "No one can serve two masters" (cf. Mt. 6:24). He presumes that we are always in servitude to someone or something. The question is to whom or what.

The second motive for the petition highlights the interior work of grace conjoined with discipline by means of an ablative absolute clause: *dilatato corde*. The Collect translates this clause as "with a loving heart," and likely refers again to Benedict's words above. We may translate this clause even more literally: "with a broadened or enlarged heart," or even "with a heart having been opened wide." What a marvelous little clause! It speaks to the humility, generosity, and fortitude to which every Christian is called by Baptism and Confirmation. A "heart opened wide" with these virtues enables us to run in the path of the commandments, i.e., to be strong in love of God and neighbor. Such a heart depends upon spiritual athleticism. Just as physical running/exercise requires regular discipline and sacrifice, so too, spiritual running requires regular spiritual athleticism, especially daily prayer and reading of Scripture, both of which are constitutive to Benedict's *Rule*.
