
ABOUT OUR PARISH

REMEMBERING THE CONSECRATION OF THE "NEW" ST. MARY'S CHURCH: APRIL 30th, 1876

This year is the 150th Jubilee of our Parish which was founded in 1870 as St. Mary's. Our parish church of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes is actually the third one for St. Mary's. When it was consecrated on Thanksgiving Day, 1910, it received the new name of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes. (This is the reason for the discrepancy in the names of the parish church and the parish cemetery: the parish cemetery retained its original name of St. Mary's.)

Our parish archivist Martha Phillips has discovered the newspaper account of the dedication of the second parish church of St. Mary's after extensive renovations were made. This consecration took place on April 30th, 1876.

A SOLEMN SERVICE

(Monday, May 1st, 1876, "Boston Globe")

The enlargement and improvement of the Catholic Church at Newton Upper Falls having been completed, the edifice was re-dedicated Sunday morning. The work was begun in August last, and has been done under the supervision of the pastor Rev. Michael Dolan, at a cost estimated at \$15,000. The addition is on the east end of the church building being about eighty feet in length and forty feet in width, thus shaping the form of the edifice like the letter T. The dimensions of the old portion of the building are about 115x40 feet. The building inside and out presents the appearance of a new edifice so thorough and substantial are the repairs and improvements

upon it. Its seating capacity has been increased to about 1200, the galleries in the T extension accommodating about 100 each. The gallery in the rear of the audience room, where the organ is located, is to be occupied by the choir. The fronts of the galleries, the pews and in fact all the interior wood finish of the building is of ash the walls being sheaved to several feet. The chancel railing is of ash with handsome black walnut trimmings, and the altar, which is from the establishment of Joseph F. Paul & Co. of Boston, is in keeping with its surroundings. On one side is a statue representing the Blessed Virgin Mary and Child, and on the other one representing St. Joseph. On either side of the chancel is a small vestry or retiring room. The walls and ceiling of the audience room have been frescoed in bright tints, and the general effect is very fine. There are three entrances to the building—one in each end of the T extension and one in front of the building, all the doors opening into a small vestibule which has direct communication with the main apartment. All the windows in the new portion of the building are of ground glass excepting the one over the chancel, which is of stained of a handsome pattern. The basement now extends under the entire building, and is to be occupied by the Sunday School. The carpenter's work was done by J. H. Sweeney of Cambridge, and the frescoing by Herbert Steffin of Boston. The dedicatory services, which commenced at 10 A.M. yesterday, were very numerously attended by the Catholics of Newton and vicinity, and were those prescribed by the church ritual. The Right Reverend Archbishop Williams of Boston conducted the services, and was assisted by the pastor, the Rev. Michael Dolan, and a large number of the Catholic clergy hereabouts. After the ceremony of blessing the walls inside and out, Stockton's Mass was celebrated. The Rev. Hugh Mulligan of St. Charles College, Maryland, was master of ceremonies, the Rev. Bernard Flood of Waltham celebrant, the Rev. William Byrne of Charlestown deacon, and the Rev. Laurence J. Morris of Brookline sub-deacon.

The sermon was preached by the Right Reverend Bishop Healy of Portland. Miss Lizzie McDonough of Boston presided at the organ, and the choir, which has recently re-organized, sang under the direction of Miss Maggie Cahill. Among other clergymen who participated were the Rev. W. A. Blinkensop of South Boston, the Rev. P.J. Rogers of Brighton, the Rev. Father McManus of West Newton and the Rev. Father Farren of Stoneham. In the afternoon the rite of confirmation was administered to 155 persons.

POST-COMMUNION
(4th SUNDAY OF EASTER)
(Missale Romanum 1970)

“Look upon Your flock, kind Shepherd, and be pleased to settle in eternal pastures the sheep You have redeemed by the Precious Blood of Your Son. Who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen.”

This post-Communion prayer highlights the promise Christ makes to us in John 10, a portion of which is read as today’s Gospel (lectionary Year A): *“I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly”* (cf. Jn. 10:10, RSV). This abundant life of which Jesus speaks consists in enjoying God forever in the *“eternal pastures”* of heaven. The feeding analogy here in this prayer after Communion should not be lost on us, for Holy Communion is the beginning of life in heaven where we *“feed”* on the inexhaustible glory of God’s presence and enjoy His friendship. (Cf. Bl. Columba Marmion, OSB, *Christ in His Mysteries*, p. 358).

As we are unable at this time to receive the Blessed Sacrament, we rely on God’s kindness in nourishing us with His grace as we make *“Spiritual Communions.”* Let us use this time as opportunistically as we can by exercising our desire for the *“eternal pastures”* of heaven. There, God will wipe away all our tears, and provide super-abundantly for us (cf. Rev. 21:4-6).

This post-Communion prayer also highlights the means by which this feeding in the *“eternal pastures”* is possible: Christ’s Precious Blood shed for us on the Cross. In Gospel for lectionary Year B on Good Shepherd Sunday (next year), we hear about this truth in another selection of John 10: *“I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.....No one takes [My life] from Me, but I lay it down of*

My own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again; this charge I have received from My Father” (cf. Jn. 10: 11, 18, RSV). I am always struck by the boldness and frankness with which Our Lord foretells His freely chosen sacrificial death and His mighty and glorious resurrection.

In view of the plain teaching of the Scriptures, we see that Christ’s redemption is not one path to God among many. Rather, His satisfaction for our sins is the only and exclusive way to the Father, as He Himself and the apostles testify throughout the New Testament. Jesus Himself is quite plain during the Last Supper: *“I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but by Me”* (cf. Jn. 14:6, RSV). In today’s second reading, St. Peter cuts to the quick in his sermon on Pentecost morning, clearly proclaiming Jesus as the universal Saviour, both for Jews and Gentiles.

Since Christ is our only Savior and the Good Shepherd, we ask for the grace of obtaining the fruit of his unique redeeming sacrifice, namely, the *“eternal pastures”* of heaven. We are asking Him, by implication, that we might also remain faithful to Him to the last, i.e., the grace of final perseverance. Every Good Shepherd Sunday affords us an opportunity to plead with Christ to defend us here below from the wolf of our souls, the devil, and so to convey us safely to heaven, laying us across His shoulders like a lamb. May Eastertide buoy us up with greater trust in the power of our Risen Lord to do just that! (cf. Marmion, *Christ in His Mysteries*, pp. 362-70).




