Pastor's Note



Fr. Higgins SAINT ELIZABETH OF PORTUGAL: BEARER OF CHRIST'S PEACE



Among the Saints' relics adorning the reredos of our High Altar is one of St. Elizabeth, Oueen of Portugal. (This is the reliquary in the photo to the left.) She lived from 1271-1336. In the Sanctoral Calendar of the Pauline Reform, her annual feast is celebrated on July 4th (in the U.S.A., July 5th), and in the Tridentine Missal, July 8th. She was the namesake of her great-aunt, St. Elizabeth of Hungary (who is on the stained glass window of our parish

church, Oak Street side, by the confessional) and she was to prove herself worthy of such a name. Born a Princess Royal in the Kingdom of Aragon (present-day Catalonia, Spain), her very birth was the occasion for the reconciliation between her father and her grandfather the King who had been at odds with one another.

Bringing Christ's peace into situations of conflict was to be her special unction. Married off to King Dennis of Portugal (a difficult man, to say the least) she conducted herself with dignity and piety. Her Catholic spirituality was much marked by the spirit of the Franciscan Revival going on in the Church at that time. Her example of self-renunciation and liberality to the poor left its good mark on the souls of those close to her and on the people of her Kingdom. Even during her lifetime, God granted her the gift of working miracles on behalf of the poor:

She instantaneously cured a poor woman of a loathsome ulcer by kissing it. In the depth of winter she changed the money she was going to distribute to the poor into roses, in order to conceal it from the King. She gave sight to a

virgin born blind, healed many other persons of grievous distempers by the

mere sign of the Cross, and performed a great number of other miracles of a like nature. (Roman Breviary)

Upon her husband the King's death she put on the Franciscan habit of a Poor Clare and went to the shrine of St. James the Apostle at Compostella, where she lavished riches as a sinoffering for the repose of his soul. Upon her return from Compostella:

Wholly engaged in feeding the poor, protecting widows, sheltering orphans and assisting the afflicted in every way, she lived not for herself but for the glory of God and the well-being of men.

But causing wars to cease was no less a work of grace in her life. Once, when her son Alfonso had risen up against his father in armed rebellion, she went to the battlefield and rode her horse between the two armies about to engage, the arrows already flying to signify the attack. She stopped war between King Ferdinand IV of Castile and his cousin, and also between Ferdinand and her own brother James II, King of Aragon. The occasion of her death was another peace-making mission. Despite her ill-health and the dangerous heat, she went to the town of Estremoz to make peace between two warring kings-her son and son-in-law. There she received a vision of Our Lady, to prepare her for her death, and soon after died in the peace of Christ.

How much her love for concord and peacemaking inspires! How much we should desire that spirit of peacemaking for ourselves!

<u>CATHOLIC LANGUAGE OF THE</u> <u>HOLY EUCHARIST</u>

- The BLESSED SACRAMENT a title of the Sacrament of the Eucharist which indicates its supreme position among all the (Seven) Sacraments.
- HOLY COMMUNION The reception and consumption of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist or Blessed Sacrament whereby we participate in Christ Himself and in His sacrificial work.
- MYSTERY OF FAITH A name frequently reserved to the mystery of the Holy Eucharist. In the Tridentine Missal, the words "Mysterium Fidei" are found in the consecration of the Precious Blood.

[In the Pauline Missal, the priest celebrant intones them as an invitation to the people to respond with a "Memorial Acclamation" to the double-consecration of the Bread and Wine which has just taken place.]

• The PRECIOUS BLOOD "In the Blessed Sacrament the Precious Blood is received under the species of Bread equally with the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity (and vice-versa) by virtue of the indivisibility of Christ's glorified Humanity and of the Hypo-static Union (the union of the divine and human natures in the Divine Person of Christ)."

ST. CYPRIAN ON PATIENCE

Patience—this is a virtue we share with God Himself, for patience has its source in God, and from Him derives its glory and its dignity. Both its origin and its greatness are due to God, its Author. Man should indeed love whatever is dear to God; and

whatever good His divine Majesty loves, It commends to men. If God is both our Lord and Father, we should seek to imitate the patience of our Lord and Father; for servants ought to obey, and children ought not to prove unworthy of their parentage...

Patience touches every phase of human activity; nothing can be brought to completion in all our strivings unless patience endows us with that power. It is patience that both commends us to God and keep us in His service...

Patience restrains anger, bridles the tongue, governs the mind, maintains peace, regulates discipline, breaks the force of evil desires, checks the violence of rising passions, quenches the flame of hatred, controls the power of the rich, consoles the poor in their neediness, safeguards the blessed integrity of virgins, the chastity of widows, and the inseparable union of love between those espoused or married. Patience makes man humble in prosperity, courageous in adversity, meek under insults and injuries. Patience teaches us to forgive the sinner quickly, and when we ourselves offend, to pray long and earnestly for pardon. Through patience we overcome temptation, endure persecution, embrace suffering and martyrdom itself. Patience becomes the very foundation of our faith; mightily does patience further the increase of our hope. It likewise guides all our actions, enabling us to remain on the path of Christ, walking in His patience.

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LATIN MASS PROPERS: SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: Psalm 27: 8-9 The Lord is the strength of His people, and the protector of the salvation of His anointed: save, O Lord, Thy people, and bless Thy inheritance, and rule them for ever. *Psalm 27: 8-9* Unto Thee will I cry, O Lord: O my God, be not Thou silent to me, lest if Thou be silent to me, I become like them that go down into the pit. *V*. Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT O God of all power and might, who art the giver of all good things; implant in our hearts the love of Thy name, increase in us true religion, nourish us with all goodness and by Thy mercy keep us in the same. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Romans 6: 3-11 Brethren, all we who are baptized in Christ Jesus are baptized in His death. For we are buried together with Him by baptism unto death; that as Christ is risen from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall also be in the likeness of His resurrection. Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin may be destroyed, and that we may serve sin no longer. For he that is dead is justified from sin. Now if ye be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall live also together with Christ. Knowing that Christ, rising again from the dead, dieth now no more, death shall no more have dominion over Him. For in that He died to sin He died once; but in that He liveth, He liveth unto God. So do you also reck-on yourselves to be dead indeed to sin.

GRADUAL: Psalm 89: 13, 1 Return, O Lord, a little; and be entreated in favour of Thy servants. *V*. Lord, Thou hast been our refuge from generation to generation. **ALLELUIA:** Psalm 30: 2-3 Alleluia, alleluia. *V*. In Thee, O Lord, have I hoped, let me never be confounded: deliver me in Thy justice, and release me; bow down Thy ear to me, make haste to deliver me. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: Mark 8: 1-9 **A**t that time, when there was a great multitude with Jesus, and had nothing to eat, calling His disciples together, He saith to them: I have compassion on the multitude, for behold they have now been with Me three days, and have nothing to eat; and if I shall send them away fasting to their home, they will faint in the way: for some of them came from afar off. And His disciples answered Him: From whence can any one fill them here with bread in the wilderness? And He asked them: How many loaves have ye? Who said: Seven. And He commanded the people to sit down on the ground. And taking the seven loaves, giving thanks, He broke and gave to His disciples to set before the people. And they had a few little fishes, and He blessed them, and commanded them to be set before them. And they did eat, and were filled; and they took up that which was left of the fragments, seven baskets: and they that had eaten were about four thousand: and He sent them away.
