PRAYER: IMPORTANT SUPPORTS

As the Church recommends for us all in these days of Lent the intensified practice of Fasting, Prayer and Almsgiving, I would

like to consider here the intensified practice of prayer. Specifically, I would like to consider the important supports for a personal prayer life.

To be sure the initial support for prayer is the invitation of God's grace. If God did not first put it into our hearts to speak to Him in prayer then we could not pray. But in our response there is much that we can and should do to foster a spirit of prayer.

It is very important for us to draw on content for our prayer. If we are going to "think high thoughts of God" we have to make use of the help we get from reading and then reflecting on what we read. Thus, spiritual reading as part of our routine will greatly help us.

Our first resource should be the reading of Holy Scripture. The more familiar parts of the Bible become to us, the more we actually come to know passages by heart, then the better informed our prayer life will be. When we try to speak to God, we will be better able to "get launched".

In this it is obviously important that we read Scripture with "the mind of the Church" and not go off the rails with our own fanciful interpretations or misconstructions.

The Four Books of the Gospels and the Book of Psalms should be the pre-eminent parts of our Bible-reading. The 150 Psalms of David were prayed by Christ on earth as he was a devout Jew. Therefore, these words have been sanctified by the very lips of the God-Man Jesus. They take on a spiritual meaning by the very fact of His having prayed them. Some verses are clearly prophecies of Him. Others appear to us

to be Christ speaking. The interior life of Jesus' human soul is revealed to us through the Psalms. Our own prayers, which can be so mixed in with things that are off-base and not appropriate, with a purely human emotionality, become purified and re-shaped by subsuming them in the recitation of the Psalms.

When one becomes more familiar with the Psalms from personal devotional reading, one notices how significant the Psalms are for the Liturgy of the Mass: how the Introit, Offertory and Communion antiphons give theme to the various Masses: they become the key to unlock the deeper meaning to the Mass.

Do not rely on your own lights to sustain your prayer life. Immerse yourself rather in the inspired words of Scripture and you will find therein an inexhaustible resource to draw upon when you come to God in prayer.



CATECHESIS: ON-GOING INSTRUCTION IN THE FULLNESS OF CHRISTIAN FAITH

The LOURDES CATECHISM

The Apparitions and the Lenten Liturgies



At this point in our narrative it is necessary to consider the Apparitions at Lourdes in the context of the Church's "sacred spring" of Lent.. The First Apparition occurred on the Thursday before Ash Wednesday: the Second on Shrove Sunday: the Third on the Thursday after Ash.

On this third occasion the Vision spoke to Bernadette for the first time. She asked her to visit her at the Massabielle for fifteen days (a "Fortnight"). The next series of Apparitions occurred within this Fortnight: there were Twelve in all. These Fortnight Apparitions encompassed the two remaining preparatory days of Lent—Friday and Saturday after Ash, the First Sunday in Lent, the First Sunday in Lent with its three Ember Days—Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, the Second Sunday in Lent, and the Second Week in Lent up to Thursday.

We want to pay close attention to the correlation between these Lenten days and Bernadette's various Apparitions.

The Church's Lenten liturgies as they have come down to us are a result of several centuries of development. Between the 4th-10th centuries of the Christian era the Easter preparation involved the immediate preparation of the "elect" among the catechumens for Baptism, the doing of public

penance by penitents seeking to be reconciled to the Church and re-admitted to Communion, and the encouragement of the faithful Christians to persevere in the living out of their baptismal vows.

The 4th-5th Centuries A.D. were the time of a flourishing catechumenate as people in ever greater numbers sought to become Christians. Then, as Christianity established itself as the dominant religion of society, the catechumenate withered away. In its place, however, the ranks of the penitents grew. Church discipline was strict. For those baptized Christians who sinned grievously after Baptism and were excommunicated, the only way back was to pass through the Church's arduous penance. The ashes sprinkled over the head, the wearing of sackcloth garments, the ceremony of exclusion from the Church on Ash Wednesday—these were the public humiliations imposed on the people who submitted to the doing of penance.

Whereas once the elect among the catechumens had intensively prepared themselves for Baptism over the 40-day fast, so now the penitents close to the end of their canonical penance prepared themselves over the 40-day fast for their reconciliation on the morning of Maundy Thursday.

The lives of the faithful were much influenced by the expanded role of penitents during Lent. Out of devotion and a self-accusation born of humility people voluntarily sought to take on many of the practices which the penitents were bound to do. The universality of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday is the result of this increased devotion among the faithful.

The Church's Lenten Liturgies then, as they were composed in response to this six-century development, reflect variously the lessons for the catechumens, the encouragements to the faithful, and—most especially on Thursdays—the message of mercy for the sincerely sorry to the penitents.

LATIN MASS PROPERS: SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

INTROIT: Psalm 24: 6, 3, 22 Remember, O Lord, Thy depths of compassion, and Thy mercies that are from the beginning of the world, lest at any time our enemies rule over us: deliver us, O God of Israel, from all our tribulations. *Psalm 24: 1-2* To Thee, O Lord, have I lifted up my soul: in Thee, O my God, I put my trust; let me not be ashamed. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT: O God, who seest that we have no power whatever from ourselves; keep us both outwardly in our bodies and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body and from all evil thoughts which may hurt the soul. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: 1 Thessalonians 4: 1-7 Brethren: We pray and beseech you in the Lord Jesus that, as you have received from us, how you ought to walk and to please God, so also you would walk, that you may abound the more. For you know what precepts I have given to you by the Lord Jesus. For this is the will of God, your sanctification: that you should abstain from fornication, that every one of you should know how to possess his vessel in sanctification and honour; not in the passion of lust, like the Gentiles that know not God: and that no man overreach nor circumvent his brother in business: because the Lord is the avenger of all these things, as we have told you before and have testified. For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto sanctification: in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GRADUAL: Psalm 24: 17-18 The troubles of my heart are multiplied: deliver me from my necessities, O Lord. *V.* See my abjection and my labour, and forgive me all my sins. TRACT: Psalm 105: 1-4 Give glory to the Lord, for He is good: for His mercy endureth for ever. *V.* Who shall declare the powers of the Lord: who shall set forth all His praises? V. Blessed are they that keep judgment and do justice at all times. *V.* Remember us, O Lord, in the favour of Thy people: visit us with Thy salvation.

GOSPEL: Matthew 17: 1-9 At that time Jesus taketh Peter and James, and John his brother, and bringeth them up into a high mountain apart: and He was transfigured before them. And His face did shine as the sun: and His garments became white as snow. And behold there appeared to them Moses and Elias talking with Him. And Peter answering, said to Jesus: Lord, it is good for us to be here: if Thou wilt, let us make here three tabernacles, one for Thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elias. And as He was yet speaking, behold a bright cloud overshadowed them. And lo, a voice out of the cloud, saying: This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased: hear ye Him. And the disciples hearing, fell upon their face and were very much afraid. And Jesus came and touched them, and said to them: Arise, and fear not. And they lifting up their eyes saw no one, but only Jesus. And as they came down from the mountain, Jesus charged them, saying: Tell the vision to no man till the Son of Man be risen from the dead.

OFFERTORY: Psalm 118: 47, 18 I will meditate on Thy commandments, which I have loved exceedingly: and I will lift up my hands to Thy commandments, which I have loved.
