

THE NOVUS ORDO MISSAE AND THE LITURGICAL REFORM MOVEMENT

In defending the free exercise of the Traditional Latin Mass in

the life of the Church, it is important not to set up an either/or argument *vis à vis* the Novus Ordo of Pope Paul VI. While descrying the abuses and flinching at the imposition of supercasual, come-as-you-are Mass-styles we should also recognize the positive elements in the 1970 reform of the Mass and Divine Office, and they are many.

The Apostolic Constitution on the Divine Liturgy, *Sacrosanctum Concilium*, passed by the Council Fathers at Vatican II in 1963, marks a high-point in the efforts of the Liturgical Reform Movement over the preceding century. It was not a contentious document. Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre, who became the leading figure of opposition to the Reform Missal and Breviary at the end of the 1960s, voted in favor of *Sacrosanctum Concilium*.

The Liturgical Reform Movement was a broad effort, scholarly and pastoral, to repair the yawning gap between Catholic people's devotional prayer and the official liturgy going on in front of them. In this effort, scholars looked to the record of the life of the Church in the 4th-6th Centuries A.D., when the public worship of Catholics was flourishing. Was this not a time when the prayer of the people was at one with the liturgical/objective prayer of the Church? Should we not reach back in time to recover a proper balance?

In Rome, the Latin language came to replace Greek as the language of the liturgy since Latin was the spoken language of the people. The people heard the Scriptures in their own language and could sing the liturgical parts of the Mass, particularly the Psalms which embroider the Mass-liturgy from the Introit to the Communion.

We can look at the different efforts made over a long period of time prior to Vatican Council II to bring the liturgy "back to the people", as it were. For example, there was the encouragement of using hand missals with Latin on one side and the vernacular language on the other, so that a person could follow along with the action of the Mass and take in its content: also, the introduction of the "Dialog Mass", where the lay faithful were encouraged to read out loud the parts that belonged to them and not leave it to the altar servers alone to respond, and at a High Mass that the people should sing the parts of the Mass that belonged to them—the responses and the Ordinary Prayers such as the *Kyrie*, *Gloria*, Credo, Sanctus/Benedictus and Agnus Dei. In this last regard, the re-introduction of simpler Chant Masses for the sake of the people's singing participation was encouraged over having a well-trained Choir always sing the Mass.

Understanding this we can look at the Novus Ordo of Paul VI and trace out how it was trying to further the aims of this Liturgical Reform, the chief aim being to return liturgical prayer to the People of God.

- The vernacular language liturgy and the Proclaiming of Scriptures in the vernacular.
- The greatly expanded content of Scripture in the Mass and in the Divine Office (Liturgy of the Hours). There is far more of the Bible used in the Catholic Liturgy now than there was before the Pauline Reform. In the prior Missal the Sunday Mass readings are the same each year and, outside of Lent, and Easter and Pentecost Week, there is no daily Mass reading. In the Novus Ordo Lectionary there is a 3-year Cycle for Sundays, a 2-year Cycle for daily Mass during the week, and also a complete Lectionary for each Saint's Feast on the Universal Roman Calendar.
- The use of singing has been expanded. In the older rubric, the Mass had to be either sung or read, all or nothing. In the New Mass, however, some parts may be sung even if the whole Mass is not sung.

- (continued...) This was designed to allow for more congregational singing to the unaccompanied voice, which was the original song of the Church.
- The number of obligatory Saints' feast was greatly reduced and the Sunday Liturgy was prioritized.

All of these changes reflect continuity in reform and we can see how they may further the faithlife of Catholics.

What went wrong in the implementation of these reforms? The most obvious is that they were introduced during the height of the "Sixties", when the larger society was convulsed with all kinds of upheaval. A "New Mass" was quickly high-jacked for all kinds of ideological purposes during those years. Instead of the liturgy being returned to the people, a new liturgy was bent to serve any number of ideological or personal agendas.

A more mundane reason why the high hopes of the Vatican II liturgical reform fell so far short lies in the easy transition that was made from the Low Mass with 4 hymns to the New Mass with 4 contemporary religious songs—Entrance, Offertory, Communion, and Recessional. Is this not the typical Sunday-Mass experience of Catholics? The liturgical reform called for the increased use of singing of the Mass texts, which are taken from Sacred Scripture, particularly the Scripture for the Entrance and Communion Antiphons as refrains, but in most places these parts of the Mass are paved over by the contemporary religious song, often of mediocre quality, which may or may not bear any relation to the Mass of the day.

In sum, the Novus Ordo in itself is not the problem and has much to recommend it. The two chief causes of "bad liturgy" today are the continued high-jacking of it in places for ideological purposes and the persistence of the old problems the Reform was supposed to remedy: that is, of priests saying Mass with little sense of religion and of the faithful dutifully attending, watching, giving the few rote responses, and then going back about the business of their lives unmoved.


