CONFERENCE VI: ENGLISH CATHOLICISM, SURVIVAL AND REVIVAL (CONCLUDING CONFERENCE) (Conference given on April 11th)

3In last week's Conference we saw how the English Reformation was a top-down, four-part "Royal Reformation", encompassing the reigns of Henry VIII and his three surviving children Edward, Mary, and Elizabeth over a period of thirty years, from 1534-1564. Henry's Reformation was a "Rupture with Rome" over his desire to annul his marriage to Catherine of Aragon and marry his mistress Anne Boleyn. Henry declared himself "Supreme Head of the Church in England", broke off relations with the Pope, and brought the English clergy to heel, most dramatically and violently by suppressing all of the monasteries and religious houses.

Under the boy-King Edward VI, the radical Protestantization of England took place, led by Thomas Cranmer, the Archbishop of Canterbury. When Edward died after only six years, Mary restored Catholicism. Mary's reign, however, was even briefer than Edward's: five years. Elizabeth pretended to be a Catholic to secure her claim to the Throne, but once she had done so she allied herself with the English Protestants and set about persecuting England's Catholics.

Elizabeth reigned nearly 45 years. Her long reign and the intensity of coercive measures to make all of her subjects submit to her established Church of England ,with her as the Supreme Head, reduced the English Catholic population to a marginal minority. To use a contemporary expression, the Catholics were "other-ized" as a subversive element.

So began the period of the Penal Times and the Recusancy Lists. A "recusant" was someone

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who "refused" (*recusare*) to follow the religious laws of the Elizabethan Settlement. Here, for example, is the wording of an Elizabethan Statute from 1593, entitled *An Act for restraining Popish Recusants to some certain place of abode: "One who is convicted for not repairing to some Church, Chapel or usual place of Common Prayer to hear Divine Service there, but forbearing the same contrary to the tenor of the laws and statutes heretofore made and provided in that behalf."*

To be legally proscribed as a "Popish Recusant Convict" meant being subjected to ruinous fines and all kinds of civil disabilities. Non-payment of the fines coupled with a refusal to leave the realm was a capital crime, deserving of death. And many English Catholics did die, giving the Church many blood martyrs.

These penal laws were in force across Great Britain and Ireland. The lists of recusants was very great. Although not all recusants were Catholics they were by far the larger number. As with the persecution of the Early Church under the Roman Emperors, so it was with the enforcement of the Recusancy Laws in Protestant England. They varied over time and place from stringent to dormant. People could be lulled by the periods of non-enforcement to think that the worst was over, that the persecution was lifting... only to have things suddenly explode all over again!

Broadly speaking, we can identify the time between 1559-1700 as the worst period of active anti-Catholic persecution in Great Britain, Ireland and the British colonies of North America. After 1700, we can follow a trajectory of negative repression tending to gradual relaxation. In 1780, it was estimated that the Catholic population in England was at 60,000, which is a remarkably good-sized remnant when you think of all that had been set against it.

It was not until 1829, however, that the Penal Times definitively ended with Catholic Emancipation. In 1850, after almost 300 years, the Catholic hierarchy was re-established in England. The re-constituted Catholic dioceses in England, however, were not allowed to have the same names as the historic dioceses: there could be no Catholic Bishop of London alongside a Protestant Church of England Bishop of London. The new Catholic hierarchy of England would have to preside over dioceses with entirely new names. Hence, the Catholic Bishop of London is the Catholic Bishop of Westminster, and so on.

It is now time to draw together some reflections on the subject of our Lenten Mission over these past six weeks, *Themes in English Catholicism*.

The chief reflection I would like to leave with you is this: *The American Catholicism we live and breathe is largely the outgrowth of English Catholicism.* The mission of Pope Gregory the Great to the *Angli* in the late 6th Century A.D. is continued in us.

You may object: "Not so! We are *Irish* Catholics!" Well, Ireland was already an appanage of Tudor England at the time of the Reformation, which meant that the Church organization and the Church order in Ireland reflected that of England. During the long era of the Penal Times, Irish Catholics and English Catholics were fellow sufferers. Irish Catholic resistance to the Protestant established Church of Ireland is a parallel to the English Catholic resistance to the Protestant established Church of England. It was part of the same struggle.

The Irish Catholic Church was squarely in the Anglo-sphere. After 1800 Ireland was formally united to Great Britain. The famous "Union Jack" British flag shows three Crosses: The Red Cross of St. George for England, the white X Cross of St. Andrew for Scotland, and the white Cross of St. Patrick for Ireland. At the time of the mass immigration of Irish to the United States in the wake of the Great Famine of the late 1840s, these immigrants were all British subjects of Queen Victoria. If we think of our Irish Catholic forbears as Victorian-era British Catholics from Ireland then we will get a clearer idea of our origins.

One of the most beloved traditional hymns for St. Patrick's Day among Irish Catholics is *All Praise* to St. Patrick. The text is an over-the-top reveling in ... (Continued on Page 9...)

The text is an over-the-top reveling in the faithful Celtic Catholic identity against the Protestant English incursion. But who wrote this text? Why it was Fr. Frederick William Faber (1814-1863), an *Englishman*, and a former Protestant Anglican clergyman, who converted to Catholicism and was ordained a Catholic priest!

So, we do not want to ignore nor shun our English Catholic heritage. They are beautiful and graced origins, as we have heard here in our Conferences. Appropriating, if I may, from one of the English World War I soldier poets, Rupert Brooke, I encourage us to take that English Catholic heritage in all its Englishness and to nestle it snugly into our American Catholic spiritual life:

There shall be/ In that rich earth a richer dust concealed; A dust whom England bore, shaped, made aware,/ Gave, once, her flowers to love, her ways to roam,/ A body of England's, breathing English air,/ Washed by the rivers, blest by suns of home.

GOSPEL: Continuation of the holy Gospel according to St. John 10. 11-16 At that time Jesus said to the Pharisees: I am the good Shepherd. The good Shepherd giveth His life for His sheep. But the hireling, and he that is not the shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming and leaveth the sheep and fleeth: and the wolf catcheth and scattereth the sheep: and the hireling fleeth, because he is a hireling and he hath no care for the sheep. I am the good Shepherd: and I know Mine, and Mine know Me. As the Father knoweth Me, and I know the Father: and I lay down My life for My sheep. And other sheep I have that are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice, and there shall be one fold and one shepherd.
