## NOVEMBER IS THE MONTH OF REMEMBRANCE OF THE DEAD



*(Front Cover: A Veterans Statue in Mt. Pleasant, Minnesota. November 11th is observed as “Veterans Day” in the U.S., a national day of remembrance for all those who have served in the military services of our country, particularly during time of war. Originally, November 11th was observed as “Armistice Day”, the day when the truce was declared in 1918 which brought an end to the First World War. We pray at our Masses this Sunday for the special intention of all the veterans of our parish of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes.)*

### “THE ELEVENTH HOUR OF THE ELEVENTH DAY OF THE ELEVENTH MONTH...”

Almost forgotten now is the victorious Allies’ decision on when to declare the truce which ended the fighting of World War I in 1918. The German Armistice Commission had accepted the imposed terms on November 7th, but the fighting was let to continue for another four days, until “*the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.*” (From a Catholic sensibility there is a poignancy to the choice of November 11th as the Armistice Day: November 11th is the Feast of St. Martin of Tours, Patron Saint of Soldiers, and St. Martin was the 4th century Roman soldier who forsook his soldier’s profession for the sake of the Peace of Christ.)

Here is the historian Robert Leckie’s description of the moment of Armistice:

*One by one the guns fell silent. Here and there came the clattering of a machine gun being emptied into the air. On the eleventh hour all was still. Like moles, the men came up into the weak and winter sunlight. They looked at each other, dumbfounded. They began to laugh, they began to cry, they began to shout and cheer, to pound each other on the back—and to walk slowly, hesitantly, but nevertheless erect, onto those no man’s lands of shell-pocked mud that symbolized this dreadful war that was now ending.*

*No bullets whispered, no shells whined, and they went forward to greet “the Krauts,” to smoke and trade and to come back with fewer cigarettes but laden with Iron Crosses and Lugers. That afternoon, like joyful children released from school, they played hopscotch, duck-on-the-rock, and blind-man’s buff. That night they shot off Very lights and colored rockets.*

*They sat there watching, these men of both sides, while a great peace came upon them and a sickle moon shone faintly over all that tortured earth. (Robert Leckie: The Story of World War I, A.D. 1965)*


In the immediate aftermath many people hoped that the good that might come out of this “Great War” of 1914-1918 was that the family of nations had been so shocked by the experience that it would bring an end to the practice of war itself. Thus, this war would be remembered ever after as “The-War-to-End-All-Wars.”

Sadly, as we know, this is not what happened. Instead, WWI was the gateway to a new and more terrible Age of War from which humanity has not yet emerged. How urgent our Christian duty is to pray and to labor for peace.

## Meditation on Death by St. Francis de Sales

Consider the uncertainty of the time of your death. Will it be summer or in winter, by day or by night, with or without warning, after illness or by accident, with or without the aid of the Sacraments? Of all this you know nothing. All you are certain of is that you will die. It may be sooner than expected. Death is the end of the world as far as you are concerned. Then the time values will be reversed. Pleasures, vanities, worldly joys, empty attachments—all of these will seem then like mere phantoms, passing clouds. What folly to have offended or neglected God for such delusive trifles! On the other hand, your good works and devotion will then seem sweet and precious. You will regret not having done more for your soul and for God. The evil you did will seem greater and your devotion very small. You must bid a painful farewell to this world, good-bye to riches, vanities, frivolous companions, pastimes, friendships and neighbors, family, everything and everyone. Last of all you must leave your own body... Your best friends will hasten to hide you beneath the ground. That done, scarcely a thought of you will remain. You will be forgotten as you had forgotten others. The most you can hope for is an occasional 'God rest his soul.' O death, how pitiless, how unsparing you are! Then comes eternity, happy or miserable. Which shall yours be? That which you choose in life. Pray for the grace of a happy death, and for the means to secure it. Put only a relative value on temporal things. Never put your heart on them so as to endanger your eternal salvation. Resolve to *prepare for death by being always ready.*




# Religious Education

**COLLECT** In Thine infinite goodness, we beseech Thee, O Lord, to watch over Thy household, that even as it relies solely upon the hope of Thy heavenly grace, so it may ever be defended by Thy protection. Through our Lord.

**EPISTLE: Colossians 3: 12-17** Brethren: Put ye on as the elect of God, holy and beloved, the depths of mercy, benignity, humility, modesty, patience: bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if any have a complaint against another: even as the Lord hath forgiven you, so do you also. But above all these things have charity, which is the bond of perfection: and let the peace of Christ rejoice in your hearts, wherein also you are called in one body: and be ye thankful. And the servants said to him: Wilt thou that we go and gather it up? And he said: No, lest perhaps, gathering up the tares, you root up the wheat also together with it. Suffer both to grow until the harvest, and in the time of the harvest I will say to the reapers: Gather up first the tares and bind it into bundles to burn, but the wheat gather ye into my barn.



## Upcoming Decision on a Pastoral Plan for the Archdiocese of Boston November 15, 2012 @ 2pm – [BostonCatholicLive.com](http://BostonCatholicLive.com)

- **Disciples in Mission** is the name for the Proposal of a Pastoral Plan for the Archdiocese of Boston.
- On November 15, 2012 at 2:00pm, Cardinal Seán will announce his decisions on the various recommendations on the Proposal received from the Archdiocesan Pastoral Planning Council (APPC). This news conference will be streamed live at [www.BostonCatholicLive.com](http://www.BostonCatholicLive.com). - The **Disciples in Mission** proposal had two parts:
  - Part One is entitled “*Strengthening Parishes for the Work of the New Evangelization.*” It contains recommendations to strengthen the existing 288 parishes in the archdiocese and to reorient our archdiocese to the work of evangelization.
  - Part Two of Disciples in Mission is entitled “*Strengthening the Work of the New Evangelization in Parishes.*” It contains recommendations for re-energizing pastoral leadership in parishes and the Central Ministries of the Archdiocese and for strengthening youth and adult faith formation.



### Recommendations from the August Proposal from the APPC

#### Strengthening parishes for the work of the New Evangelization\*

- That the 288 parishes of the Archdiocese be organized into approximately 135 parish collaboratives
- That the formation of the parish collaboratives be phased in over a period of 5 years.
- That the parishes of each collaborative be assigned one single Pastor.
- That there be one Pastoral Team serving each collaborative under the leadership of the Pastor.
- That the collaborative have one Pastoral Council and (if possible) one Finance Council.
- That the pastor, pastoral team, and councils of each parish collaborative participate in extensive theological and practical training for the New Evangelization.
- That each collaborative develop a local pastoral plan.

#### Strengthening the work of the New Evangelization in parishes\*

- That the Archdiocese make significant investment in training to aid the implementation of Disciples in Mission. This training will take place in six stages.
- That the Archdiocese continue its extensive consultation of parishes and parishioners, focusing on best practices for evangelization.
- That the Archdiocese provides significant adult faith formation opportunities during the Year of Faith.
- That the Archdiocese implements the remaining recommendations from the Committee to Study Lay Formation programs and from the Religious Education Task Force.
